








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# MOW Never




Rallying Around Homecoming






# Rules are made to break








# BLOOD DRIVE

The Nearly Naked Run is a proud Marshall High School tradition that is sure to be continued, come rain, snow, or shine, in the coming years.






### Science



# Music




#### **Another Season of Redhawk Pride**

## Building Champions













#### Varsity:




Team captains Connor Goodman and Bobby


# Bowling








Boys

"I can. I will"






