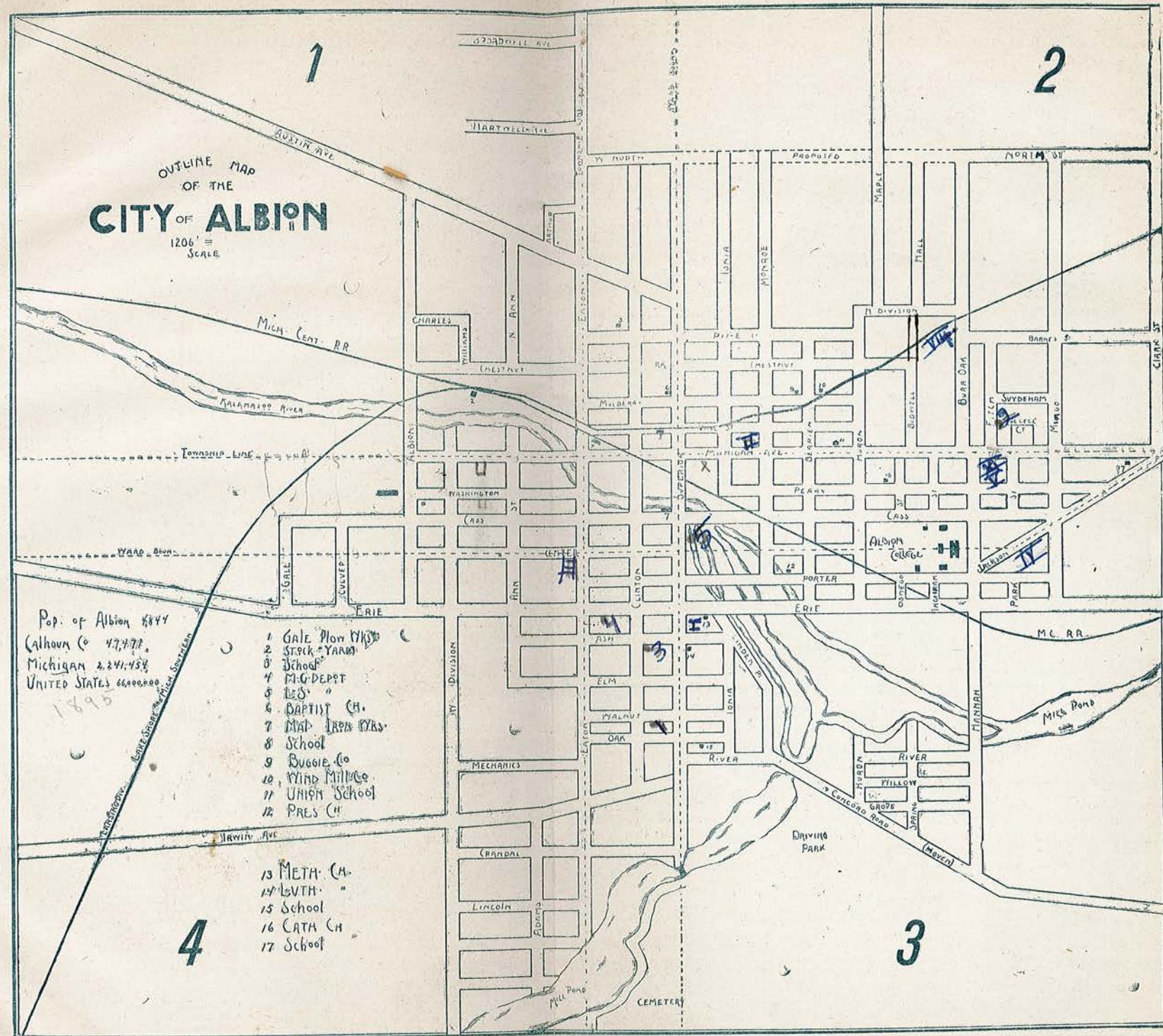

PUBLISHER'S NOTE.

In putting forth this directory of Albion the fact is fully realized that the work is in a measure imperfect. The changing of residences in the city, the removing of some from the place, as well as others taking up their abode within its limits, all of these constant movements make it impossible for a directory of this place, as of any other, to be absolutely correct in its directing ability. In this place the chance for error has been increased somewhat for the reason that after all names were collected it became necessary for the city to re-number several mis-numbered houses. All these changes have been made and subscribers and the public generally are cautioned against too hasty conclusions as regards inaccuracy of the book if their numbers given in this work are not as the old ones. Everyone is exhorted to have their numbers correspond with the revised list in possession of the officials at the city council rooms.

The Illustrated City Directory of Albion, however, is, in the opinions of many who have reviewed the proof sheets, practically free from error; the list of additions and corrections assist to make the work more complete and accurate, there being a few errors in the general list which have been corrected under this head.

If there are any serious errors they have crept in unavoidably and the publisher sincerely trusts that none of these will be found out until all collections have been made; that he, himself, will have become but a memory, and has departed for other points, far, far away.

Aside from the City Directory proper there have been inserted sketches, in some instances illustrated. This feature of the work may not at the very present be especially valuable. Yet as time wears on, bringing many changes, these sketches, illustrations and portraits will prove to be relics of a very interesting nature. Therefore, combining the two parts, the illustrations and directory, one will be serviceable at first and for a short time in directing the public, and by the time this feature has become useless, time will have rendered the illustrations peculiarly attractive and interesting. Thus will this work be for some time to come a volume worthy of the recognition and patronage of the enterprising citizens of Albion, to whom, indirectly, its publication is due.

P. S.—Owing to constant changes taking place among residents, an extra sheet will be issued later, probably by May 1, 1895, giving all the latest changes in the city's populace. By inserting this in the published volume the subscribers will have practically a new directory for 1895-6.

THE CITY OF ALBION.

To give anything like a complete historical article on the development of Albion would require space many times the size of a volume such as this and to undertake it would be practically impossible in this work whose principal feature is merely one of a directive nature rather than an extended and complete historical writeup.

The apology offered for inserting it, is not that it fills a long felt want in any manner whatever; for the facts have been related heretofore in various articles and publications and in this respect have already become familiarized, but owing to its concise and limited review of the several industries, professions and business of the place, with their particular historical data given, make it a story, giving more completeness to the publication and perhaps by the way of presenting facts, may lend to the subscriber some information worthy of memorization and a better (historically speaking) idea of the city of Albion in its earlier days.

The city in size comprises about four square miles and is located upon what was once an "oak opening," on the east and west banks of the Kalamazoo river, the elevation being about 60 feet above the level of Lake Michigan. The water supply is furnished by artesian wells whose source is from the land elevations around Hillsdale. These furnish an abundant supply of the purest water.

Albion received its name away back in 1831, it being christened such by Mrs. Eleanor Peabody. It had previously been known as "The Forks" from the fact that the Kalamazoo river divides into two branches or forks at this place. Several wished to call the place Albion, while others had different cognomens. Finally it was left to this lady who determined upon Albion as the name it should have.

About the years 1830-31 the impetus given to immigration toward the west was at a high point. For ten or fifteen years previous to this all immigrants had jumped into Ohio and some into Indiana. At this time the idea was prevalent that Michigan was a vast swamp, the home of malaria, and a bad country to settle in. Soon after explorations were made by General Cass and his reports disproved all this. It was found that the soil was particularly fertile on the prairie lands and inland lakes abounded throughout the region. The soil was such as to tempt the enterprise of the young and middle aged, and emigrants, particularly from New York, poured into Michigan. Some, even of those advanced in years, sought out new homes on its fertile lands.

The first entry of land in the township was made Oct. 16, 1830, by Ephraim Harrison, it being the north half of the northeast quarter of section 2. At that time this community was the haunt of wild beasts, and the Aborigines who pursued them were scarcely less wild than the animals they made their prey. The first white man who made Albion his home was Tenny Peabody, Esq., of Keempville, Niagara county, N. Y., who arrived in these limits in February, 1831. He purchased lands entered by Darius Pierce of Washtenaw county, which included the south half of the northwest quarter of section 2, where the main part of the city now stands, and also of Sidney Ketchum, who had settled in Marshall the same season. Mr. Ketchum's entry included a part, if not all, of the northeast quarter of section 35 in the township of Sheridan. These purchases were made for a consideration less than \$200. Having returned to his New York home for the purpose, he started back in March, 1832, with his family for his prospective home in the west. At first he left them a few miles east at a place now known as Somerfield while he hastened forward to prepare a shelter for them on his newly acquired possessions. With the assistance of his nephew, Mr. Charles Blanchard, and two others he set to work to build a house, the first one erected in the present city limits, it being located upon the site of Dr. Barker's house on East Porter street. This dwelling was in size 16x18 feet. For a roof they used hay, which they brought from Elder Fassett, eight miles east at Somerfield. A large hole was made in the thatching to allow the smoke to escape from the fireplace; blankets served as doors and windows, and for a floor logs were split (in two) and hewed flat. In this first shanty, which was completed in three days, dwelt for nine months three adults and seven children. As soon as practicable after this Mr. Peabody built a block house on the east side of the Kalamazoo river nearly opposite

to where the Presbyterian church now stands. He occupied this for about eight years and then built a house on his farm, which is now sub-divided, Prof. Delos Fall's residence being located on one portion of it. Mr. Peabody died in Albion July 12, 1856, aged 63 years.

Jacob Devoe was the next man after Mr. Peabody to take up his residence here. He came from Batavia, N. Y., and settled on the south half of the southwest quarter of section 35, Sheridan, and built a log house thereon. He remained here but a year or two, moving further on west, and shortly after, died. The third settler was Ashael Finch. After him came Warham Warner, Esq., who had bought the last part of section 3 adjoining Eaton St. besides other lands in other parts of Albion and Sheridan. Mr. Warner's first work of any magnitude was to put up the frame of a saw mill to be owned by himself and Tenny Peabody in equal partnership. This mill stood in the rear of the Albion Milling Company mill on South Superior St. A race was dug and a dam built near where the present dam now stands, south of the village. Mr. Warner at that time proposed to build a grist mill for his sole occupation. In 1835, however, he sold out his interest to Jesse Crowell, Esq., a newly arrived easterner, who after making this purchase returned to his former home, remaining there until the following year. The next year he together with two gentlemen, Issachar Frost and Daniel S. Bacon, united in buying about 300 acres of land of Tenny Peabody and a village was laid out, the plat of which was recorded in June, '36. This probably was the original Albion company.

Mr. Warner afterward laid out a number of blocks and lots on section 3, adjoining the village plat above alluded to, to which he gave the name of Warner's addition to the village of Albion.

The first merchant in Albion was Philo Taylor, to whom the Albion company gave a lot for a store, its location being where the Methodist church now stands. The Albion company then erected a grist mill which commenced running in Sept., 1837. A portion of the old superstructure forms a part of the mill now in operation and owned by W. B. Knickerbocker.

At this time there were no railroads; all wheat and flour exported had to be carried to Detroit in wagons at a cost of \$1.69 per barrel, the trip occupying about ten days. The exporting of flour and wheat commenced in 1838. Shortly after this the interest of the Albion company was divided into seven parts, six parts of which were taken by the following named gentlemen: Jesse Crowell, Issachar Frost, Daniel S. Bacon, Tenny Peabody, Chas. Rice and Hon. Chas. H. Carroll of Livingston county, N. Y. The remaining seventh was assigned to Prof. McVickar of New York college jointly with W. T. Carroll of the city of Washington, clerk of the supreme court of the United States. In 1842 the company was again divided, Mr. Peabody and Prof. McVickar taking the village lots and C. F. Carroll the Peabody mill property extending southward and east above the dam on the east branch of the Kalamazoo river. D. S. Bacon closed his accounts with the Albion company by selling his interest to Chas. Rice, I. Frost and J. Crowell. Early in 1839 the Albion company gave sixty acres of land fronting on Ingham street and extending east to the line between sections 1 and 2, to the trustees of the Wesleyan Seminary as a site for an institution of learning. They also placed blocks 44, 45 and the half blocks 55 and 56, north and south of Union Square and lying west of Ingham street and in front of the seminary grounds, under the control of the trustees for the stipulated purpose of having an open space in front of contemplated seminary buildings to form a park for the students. At this time Albion had received a considerable accession of members. Wm. M. Pearl and Mr. Holbrook put up the old Peabody block on Erie street for a store. A. Warner in 1836 built the neat building east of the brick store subsequently erected in 1840 by J. Crowell, now owned by Geo. J. Phippany.

Isaac S. Jackson bought out Philo Taylor and died here in 1840, having occupied a merchantile position up to that time. He had been joined by Jesse Crowell as partner, and after his death the latter continued the business with others in the firm until January, 1853. The nearest postoffice for Albion was, up to 1838, at Reuben Abbott's public house on the Marshall road, called Waterburgh postoffice. In this year Jesse Crowell was appointed postmaster, the office being first in the building located on the present site of the Warner block. This gentleman was continued in office as postmaster till 1849, when he was succeeded by D. C. Scranton. Other subsequent postmasters were Anson Tompson, C. W. Dalrymple, Mr. Hollingsworth, Col. P. Graves, Martin Haven, Frank Cole, Fred. F. Hoaglin, and the present postmaster, John Fanning, appointed by President Cleveland in 1893.

The free delivery of mails began Oct. 1, 1889. At present there are three carriers. The numbering of streets, which became necessary for the free delivery system of mails, is the one used in this directory in designating the houses of the city. It is after the idea known as the Philadelphia system. The streets are divided into a north and south and an east and west portion. The numbering begins at the intersection of Cass and Superior streets so that all that portion of all streets running north and south, which lie south of Cass street have the prefix "south," as for instance, South Clinton street; that portion of all north and south streets lying north of Cass street have the word "north" as a prefix. Likewise that portion of all streets running east and west lying east of Superior street have the prefix "east," as for instance, East Erie street; and that portion of the streets lying west of Superior have the prefix "west." All even numbers are on one side of the street and odd ones on the opposite. In the business portion each business place is allotted a number; in the residence section 33 feet constitute a number. Each block is numbered by the hundred so that in going to an adjacent block the number of the houses increases one hundred. Therefore, the third block south of Cass street will be in the "three hundreds," the fifth block in the "five hundreds;" for instance, the fifth block on Clinton south of Cass will be 500 South Clinton, and the houses will be numbered 501, 503, etc., on the one side and 500, 502, etc., on the opposite; these numbers increase until the next block is reached, when the numbering changes to 600. The advantage of the system is that a person can tell how many blocks away a certain house is by knowing its number. It is a perfect system of numbering and great credit is due Chief Peabody of the fire department for his exactness in numbering the houses in the city.

The professions were all represented at an early date. Among the first physicians to practice here were Drs. Millington, Henderson, Wheelock and Packard. The lawyers to first open an office in the place were Mr. Ferguson, Geo. Monroe, Alvin Peck, Thomas G. Pray and Fred Wheelock.

For a list of the lawyers and physicians at present located here consult the classified list of business and professional men.

Among the early hotels was the Albion Hotel on the corner of Erie and Superior streets, built by Abraham Becke in 1836-7. It afterwards passed into the hands of Jas. W. Sheldon and W. L. Granger. It is now conducted by Joseph Allen and known as the Hotel Allen. Enos Dutton commenced the erection of a tavern in 1839 and kept it the greater part of the time as a public house; became the property of Chas. F. Parker in 1848. It is now conducted by Mr. VanAtta and is known as the VanAtta house. The Albion House, kept by Gilbert Knapp, was another famous hostelry, and is yet. The present owner is Daniel D. Mitchell. The Commercial Hotel was built by Champion Eslow in the early 60's. It has been managed by several parties. At present it is under the supervision of Mr. John H. Callahan and a better host there never was than Johnny Callahan.

During the period of the 30's Detroit was a journey of ten days and the only market place available. Up to 1838, however, the young settlement consumed all it raised in the way of wheat, corn and potatoes. The first cereal raised in this section was by Charles Blanchard, who raised four acres in 1833 on the hill the present site of Albion College. He raised the first potatoes as well, and supplied the community with this then scarce luxury. For the first ten years, unless when there was a crop failure in the state of New York, wheat did not bring over 50 cents per bushel. When the Michigan Central railroad reached here in 1842-3 the inconvenience of stage travel to Detroit was done away with and as a blessing there never has been its equal. The telegraph reached here at about that time and suddenly the place seemed transported from a wilderness into a civilized community, or at least in immediate connection with it. The telegraph was a monopoly of rapid communication until a comparatively late day, when the telephone was introduced, this being in 1881. A metallic long distance phone is now being put in and will be in operation sometime in February. The local office of both telephone systems are under the management of H. W. Mosher. Albion in its early history never cut much of a figure in county or state affairs until a comparatively late day. It became a village in 1856 and a city not until 1885, less than ten years ago. Since that time it has fairly "boomed." It has not been one of those booms that reach a limit and then "bust," but a very rapid, healthy growth. This is due, for nobody else can claim the credit, to its citizens. The manufacturing establishments here are the life of the town. They are solid institutions and here to stay. As a

manufacturing place it turns out more products than any other of its size west of the Alleghanies. To enumerate some of these establishments, there is first the largest, the Gale Manufacturing Company. For a sketch of this plant see elsewhere in this work. The Albion Malleable Iron Company, established here in 1889; malleable castings for agricultural implements, carriages, bicycles, in fact a general class of malleable castings. The plant has a capacity of 2,000 tons annually. Employment is afforded 100 men the year round. The plant's buildings cover a space 90x320 feet and the hum and din constantly coming from the walls of the institution give to the stranger an idea of its capacity and greatness.

The Elms Buggy Company is another establishment that has added greatly to the city. For a sketch of this institution see page 31.

The Union Manufacturing Company, manufacturers of windmills, is another concern that has given the city no small amount of advertising, its products having gone into nearly every state and foreign country. The firm name when first established was known as Wolcott Bros. It was incorporated in 1880 with \$30,000 capital. The plant has a capacity of 500 mills per year and gives employment to 20 men.

The Wolcott Windmill and Pump Company is another concern engaged in the making of wind pumps.

Another organization that has helped the laboring class especially is the Homestead Building and Loan association. It was incorporated in August, 1889. Its accumulated resources at present amount to \$100,000. The association has in this time constructed 110 houses. Most of them are the homes of laboring men who, without the aid of this organization, would have been paying rent and had nothing to show for their money, whereas now those of the first series are nearly paid up, while those of a later date have gotten a fair portion paid for a home, which in a comparatively short time will be their own. It is a plainly noticeable fact that the dwellings of the laboring classes of Albion, which in most cities are mere shanties or tumble-down houses, are of the most solid structure, modern architecture and respectable appearing. All this is due to this building association which began business here less than six years ago. It is officered as follows: President, L. J. Wolcott; vice president, Robert Glascoff; secretary, Otis A. Leonard; treasurer, H. M. Dearing; attorney, M. D. Weeks.

The first newspaper issued in the place was called the Albion Press. This was in December, 1849. Its editor was James Hugh Perry. Its career was very limited.

In October, 1855, L. W. Cole, Esq., commenced the publication of the Albion Mirror. After Mr. Cole's death it became the property of his son, F. F. Cole, who is at present its proprietor and editor. The Albion Recorder was started in 1868 by Bissell & Burgess; later by Bissell & Reed. It was intended to take the place of the Albion Herald, the office of which was destroyed by fire in 1868. The paper has changed management since then and is now owned and published by Vernor J. Tefft.

Albion never was large enough to support a gas plant for street lighting at the time when this system was the only one in use. Its first lighting was by the ordinary oil burners.

In 1888, a stock company, mostly Jackson capital, procured a franchise, erected an electric lighting plant and are now the present illuminators for the city. The plant consists of two alternating (incandescent) dynamos and four incandescent circuits ten miles in length. These are placed nearly all in stores, public buildings and residences. The arc system used for lighting streets and stores consists of three dynamos, two street and one commercial. There are four circuits of the arc system, one running all night to light the main thoroughfares. The plant is of the Thompson-Houston manufacture and cost \$33,000. The power obtained for driving all necessary machinery is a 850 H. P. Lansing engine. W. A. Foote of Jackson is general manager. Superintendent, S. G. Allen.

Albion's first fire protection was the Alert Fire company organized in 1856. Other companies were subsequently organized beside hose companies. Hand engines were used in case of fire until 1878. In that year the village purchased a Silsby No. 3 fire engine costing \$3,500. This was the mode of protection from conflagrations until the city put in its water works system in 1889. The plant originally cost \$50,000 and since then have been added \$10,000 in improvements. The stand pipe system is used. A stand pipe 12 feet in diameter and 134 feet in height is located in the public

park on North Superior street, this being the highest elevation within the corporation. A pressure of 80 pounds to the square inch is thus obtained. Two independent duplex acting Hughes steam pumps with a capacity of 300,000 gallons every 24 hours feed the reservoir previously described. The power is located on East Cass street and is under the supervision of J. Welper. The commissioners appointed to look after the water works system are: H. M. Dearing, president; P. M. Dearing, clerk; M. S. Amsden, A. J. Gale, Isaac Sibley; F. W. Peabody, superintendent.

Albion is a city two miles wide and one and three-quarters long north and south. It has had one of the most remarkable growths in the past five years of any town in the state. Its population, including about 300 students who reside here during the school year, numbers 4,844 souls according to the census of June, 1894, and according to this same authority is the second municipality in size in Calhoun county. 4,143 are native and 701 foreign born.

As a municipality the city is a model one both in its advantages derived from nature and its good features bestowed upon it by those who have lived here and those who are at present its citizens. The college, which has undoubtedly advertised Albion more than any other feature, has helped to raise the standard of education and, too, morality. The schools and churches and societies and associations with a scientific, literary, musical or other scope tend to give the place a make-up which is progressive and enlightening. It is a manufacturing town in the extreme; yet it is far different from all other manufacturing towns in the character of its laborers. The German element predominates among the foreign class and is one of the strong factors of the population. And to the founders of ideal cities it might be suggested that Albion has the happy combination, a manufacturing class on the one hand and an educational institution on the other. At home they each reflect good upon the other and abroad they advertise the city by the products they turn out. Thus in grandeur and glory do we find Albion in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five.

CHURCHES OF ALBION.

FIRST METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH

CORNER ERIE AND IONIA STREETS.

The history of Albion Methodism dates back to 1834, when the first sermon was preached by Rev. Henry Ercauback. The charter members were Almon and Lurensa Herrick, Betsey Montcalm, Thomas Pray, Polly Pray, Chas. M. Cobb and Armenia Cobb. The charter was granted in 1836, the year when the Michigan Conference was organized. The society's first house of worship was a wooden structure which stood near Josiah Wright's house, 317 East Porter street. It was built in 1839. In 1849 a brick edifice was begun on Erie street, the site of the present one. It was dedicated by Bishop Morris in 1850, at which time the Michigan conference held its annual session in it. Its cost was \$9,000. The congregation steadily increased in numbers until even this structure was found too small to accommodate the people. In the fall of 1887, Washington Gardner, now secretary of state, was appointed to Albion. Under his skillful leadership \$25,000 was secured toward a new church, and the following year the old building was removed and the present beautiful edifice erected in its place. Bishop John P. Newman preached the dedicatory sermon June 16, 1889. He was assisted in the service by President Fisk and others. There was present a great congregation who contributed during the day \$10,115, enough with what had been given by the Ladies' Aid society, to provide for all indebtedness including the cost of organ and furniture. The property is valued at \$45,000, and is an ornament to the city. The church is pronounced by distinguished ministers and lecturers one of the finest in the country. The work was performed by Contractor H. W. Coddington under the administration of trustees, J. W. Sheldon, president; J. A. Howell, secretary; E. P. Robertson, treasurer; Rev. W. H. Brockway, Henry Howard, D. L. Jacobs, Marsh Dickey, Martin Haven, J. C. Kinney. Since then Messrs. Brockway, Kinney and Sheldon have died. The present board of trustees is as follows: J. A. Howell, president; Prof. D. Fall, secretary; E. P. Robertson, treasurer; Henry Howard, E. L. Jacobs, Marsh Dickey, Martin Haven, Edward Sutton, Prof. Samuel Dickie.

The church now has a membership of nearly one thousand. Its classes are under the direction of Jacob Anderson, Rev. H. D. Jordan, Mrs. N. B. Gardner, Prof. S. D. Barr, H. R. Lovejoy, Sylvanus Hull and H. B. Farley. Its Sunday schools and mission schools have a membership of 750. Prof. F. S. Goodrich superintends the main school, Rev. H. D. Jordan, E. J. Sheap and H. B. Farley the mission schools.

The church has a flourishing Epworth League and Junior League, a prosperous Ladies' Aid society, Womans' Home Missionary society, Womans' Foreign Missionary society, Young Womans' Foreign Missionary society. The College also has a missionary society which supports a native preacher.

The stewards of the church are: E. N. Parsons, president; N. J. Kirk, secretary; H. W. Mosher, treasurer; J. O. Banks, J. L. Thomas, Jacob Anderson, Sennet Ferguson, M. C. Beaman, Geo. T. Bullen, Dr. A. G. Bruce, M. B. Coykendall, J. E. Perine.

Since Rev. Henry Ercauback preached the first Methodist sermon here in 1834, the pastorates have been in the following order: Thomas Wiley, R. Lawrence, J. F. Davidson, E. H. Pilcher, F. A. Seaborn, Elijah Crane, J. Breckinridge, T. S. Jockway, R. S. Blowers, — Kernier, — Purkeyser, Roswell Park, Z. Brown, I. Bennett, Allen Staples, John Ercauback, W. H. Collins, William Mothersill, the first pastor after Albion was made a station; J. E. Parker, J. F. Davidson, R. Sapp, first pastor in the brick church built in 1849; F. A. Blades, Wm. Mahon, F. B. Bangs,

E. Holstock, R. Cogswell, R. Sapp, D. Burus, R. C. Crawford, A. J. Eldred, D. F. Barnes, J. W. Robinson, J. C. Wortley, H. M. Joy, Levi Tarr, W. H. Perrine, H. F. Spencer, Geo. S. Hickey, Levi Master, John Graham, C. L. Barnhart, Washington Gardner. J. C. Floyd was the first pastor to occupy the pulpit of the present church edifice. His pastorate was terminated after two and a half years by his appointment as superintendent of the Malaysian mission. January 1, 1891, W. F. Oldham was appointed by Presiding Elder I. R. A. Wightman to supply the pulpit until a regular pastor could be secured. In April, 1891, R. W. VanSchoick was transferred to the church from the Wyoming conference, and is now closing what will be at the end of this conference year a pastorate in Albion of nearly five years.

ST. JAMES' (PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL) CHURCH.

The St. James' Protestant Episcopal church erected an edifice in 1849 on Erie street near Clinton. Until 1865 the church was not in an active state. In 1865 the church was finished and consecrated. Rectors of the church have been: Rev. Mr. Seymour, W. G. Stowex, Rev. Mr. Peters, Rev. Mr. Morton, B. A. Brown; lay reading conducted by Dr. H. D. Thomason for a time; then Rev. B. A. Brown returned; Rev. Mr. Dickinson. Rev. Thomas H. Henley is the present rector.

The first church was burned in the winter of 1885. The present edifice, corner of Erie and Clinton, was erected soon after at a cost of \$5,000. The church now has 150 communicants.

THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

The Presbyterian church of Albion was organized Feb. 5, 1837, by Rev. Calvin Clark. There were twenty-four charter members, none of whom are now living.

During its existence the church has had fifteen pastors, the average of their pastorates being three years and four months. The first pastor was Rev. Elias Childs.

In 1840 the first church building was completed, and stood on the corner of Erie and Clinton streets. As the membership grew this was enlarged, and then sold and a new building erected upon the present site in 1858. Twice the church has been burned, the first time a total loss, as there was no insurance; the second time well insured.

In commemoration of fifty years of completed work the church celebrated, in an appropriate manner, on Feb. 23 and 24, 1887, its Semi-Centennial. This was very profitable to all.

At present the church is in a prosperous condition, with a membership of 300, a pleasant house of worship, a flourishing Sunday school, well attended social meetings, and the various benevolent organizations in good condition. With the blessing of God, and earnest work, much has been done in the past and more may be in the future.

The congregation at present is presided over by Rev. R. R. Wightman.

THE FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH OF ALBION.

Between 1833 and 1837 several Baptist families settled in Albion and at some time during this period they began to hold meetings at their houses. The first sermon was preached by Rev. Mr. Twiss, probably in the year 1836, his text being, "Those that have turned the world upside down have come hither also." The Baptist church of Albion was organized in Albion in Feb. 21, 1837. On March 4 following letters were presented and articles of faith presented at a meeting held in the school house of Albion.

On May 4, 1837, a council consisting of a delegate from the Second Milton church and one from the First Milton church and two others were called to recognize the church. Meetings were at first

held in the Presbyterian church. Until 1843 no business of importance was transacted by the church. In that year the question of a church edifice was brought up. Nothing definite was settled about a building until some time later. March 4, 1848, the church was reorganized under the corporate name of "The First Baptist Church and Society of Albion." In 1849 the construction of a house of worship was begun upon the site occupied by the present edifice.

The house was dedicated Jan. 23, 1851. This building cost \$2,500. The first Sabbath school was organized in the year 1846 and re-organized in 1851.

In 1882, \$4,000 having been subscribed for a new church, the contracts were let and the present edifice was constructed. Oct. 12, 1884, the audience room was dedicated, at which time a sufficient sum was subscribed to pay all indebtedness. The pastors who have presided over the congregation are: Rev. T. Z. R. Jones, 1837-39; Rev. C. B. Taylor, 1839-40; A. M. Baker, 1847-49; J. S. Osborn, 1849-50; Aaron Potter, 1851-55; 1855-56 not supplied; P. VanWinkle, 1856-61; Isaac M. Wade, 1861-64; B. G. Boynton, 1864-66; Isaac Gray, 1866-67; Rev. P. VanWinkle (second call) 1867-71; Isaac Horton, 1871-72; P. S. Moxon, 1872-75; A. Maynard, 1875-77; J. N. Lewis, 1878-79; L. G. Clark, 1879-81; vacant until 1882; J. C. Armstrong, 1881-83; G. B. Simmons, 1883-85; A. M. Waxam, 1886.

Rev. Fred E. Britton is the present pastor.

Other churches are: The German Lutheran church, organized about 1868 by Rev. Mr. Wilhelm. The present house of worship, corner of South Superior and Elm, was constructed in 1888. 175 members form the congregation. A Sunday school numbering 190 members is connected with the church. Rev. F. F. Meyer is the present pastor.

A Catholic church, corner of Huron and Cass streets, indicates the presence of such a denomination. No pastor resides here, but meetings are held monthly, conducted by Rev. Father Shane of Hillsdale.

ALBION COLLEGE.

There are three men whose names the friends and alumni of Albion College should hold in grateful remembrance for the founding of this institution of learning. In the spring of 1833, while Michigan was a territory, Rev. Henry Calclazer, Rev. Elijah H. Pilcher and Benjamin H. Packard, M. D., upon consultation, resolved to inaugurate a movement for the establishment of an academy of higher learning within this peninsula. The proposition awakened considerable interest among the people and pecuniary inducements were offered at several different points to secure its location. The whole matter was reported to the Ohio Annual Conference, then exercising over this territory. The subject was received with much favor by the conference, and a committee was appointed to take steps to secure necessary legislation. Spring Arbor was selected as the location of the school and in the spring of 1835 a charter was granted by the legislature under the corporate name of "Spring Arbor Seminary." The location being an unfavorable one, the school never opened at Spring Arbor and no buildings were erected. In April, 1839, by an act of the legislature, it was transferred to Albion and its name changed to the Wesleyan Seminary of Albion. The Albion company proposed to give the trustees a certain amount of land for its location and as another inducement for its transfer a few thousand dollars were pledged by the citizens to aid in the erection of buildings, if located in their midst.

In 1841 a wooden building was erected in the rear of the Central Building; in 1843 the Central Building was commenced. In November, 1843, the Seminary was opened by the faculty appointed by the board of trustees, Rev. Charles F. Stockwell, A. M., being principal. (The previous fall, 1842, a select school was opened in the rear building previously mentioned. In the succeeding winter and spring it was taught by Rev. G. P. Tindall.) About Jan. 1, 1844, the school was opened for boarders as well as students. It was patronized by the leading Methodist families of the state and within a year more than 100 boarded in the family of the steward, Rev. A. Billings, besides the many who roomed with private families or were residents in the village. In 1849 the charter of the school was amended by the erection of a female college and the corporate name became the Wesleyan Seminary and Female Collegiate Institute. The institution was empowered to grant degrees to women, but not to men. The question was not, shall women be admitted to college, but shall men be, and they were not admitted until 12 years later.

The only destructive fire that has visited the institution occurred Jan. 4, 1854. The building burned stood on the present site of the North Building which was erected as soon after the fire as the work could be carried forward. In 1861 the corporate name was changed to "Albion College," men were admitted to equal honors with the women and co-education began. In 1865 the charter was amended by creating the "Albion College Endowment Fund committee." Its object was to charge said committee with the sole management and control of the funds of said college, report semi-annually to the board of trustees the state of said funds and pay to their order the amount of interest accrued from said funds for the support of the Faculty of Instruction. Albion College had hard labor under embarrassments, like others of a similar kind in the early stages of history for want of funds. In 1866 a movement was made to raise \$100,000, \$25,000 of this to come from Albion and vicinity and the other \$75,000 from the people of the state at large. Subscriptions were secured and the greater part paid in. In 1870 at the Methodist State Convention held in Albion David Preston made the proposition that if 50 persons would, within two years, contribute \$50,000 he would go out among the people and raise \$50,000, and afterwards raised his offer \$10,000. With a subscription list headed by Hon. John Owen \$50,000 was pledged. Mr. Preston then went forth and by personal gifts of some

\$15,000 and giving to local churches wherever he went in amounts which aggregated several thousand more to inspire them to take stock in Albion College, he achieved his success and in September, 1873, he transferred to the Endowment Fund Committee \$60,000. This great effort on the part of Mr. Preston greatly advertised the institution and saved it from bankruptcy.

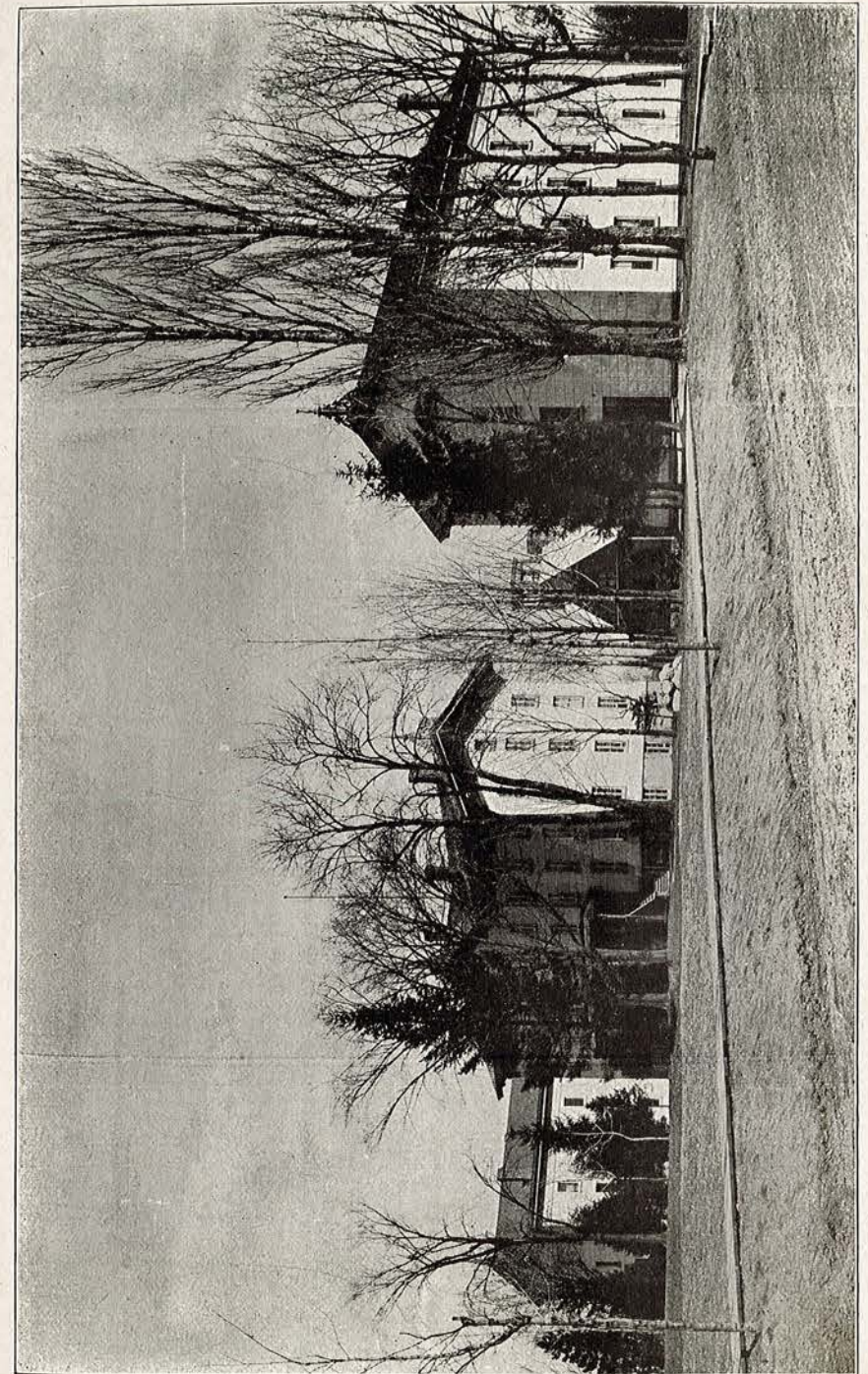
In 1883 \$20,000 was secured by subscriptions, one quarter of this being the gift of the late Senator Stockbridge. Hon. Henry M. Loud endowed the chair of history by the gift of \$30,000. Mr. Ezra Bostwick of Union City has deeded property worth \$40,000. Subsequently \$75,000 additional was deeded by this same gentleman. Rev. J. M. Reid, D. D., of New York has given property valued at \$40,000. Two friends of the College have together given \$45,000, which is to be paid over some time this year (1895). Hon. Thomas W. Palmer has pledged \$10,000 to endow a lectureship. Over \$20,000 has been subscribed for the endowment of the Alumni Professorship. Further gifts aggregating \$10,000 draw annuities. In 1883 the Astronomical Laboratory was erected through the efforts of Prof. Samuel Dickie. In 1892 the College built the gymnasium at a cost of \$8,000. A cut of this structure appears on another page. In 1892 Senator James McMillan presented to the College the McMillan Laboratory building, costing \$28,400. Improvements increased the cost of this building \$8,000.

Hon. A. T. Bliss has pledged \$50,000 for a Library Building, conditionally upon the college securing \$30,000 for endowment of the Library and \$10,000 for a war memorial museum to be placed in a portion of this building. Views of this proposed edifice and of the McMillan Laboratory appear in other parts of this work.

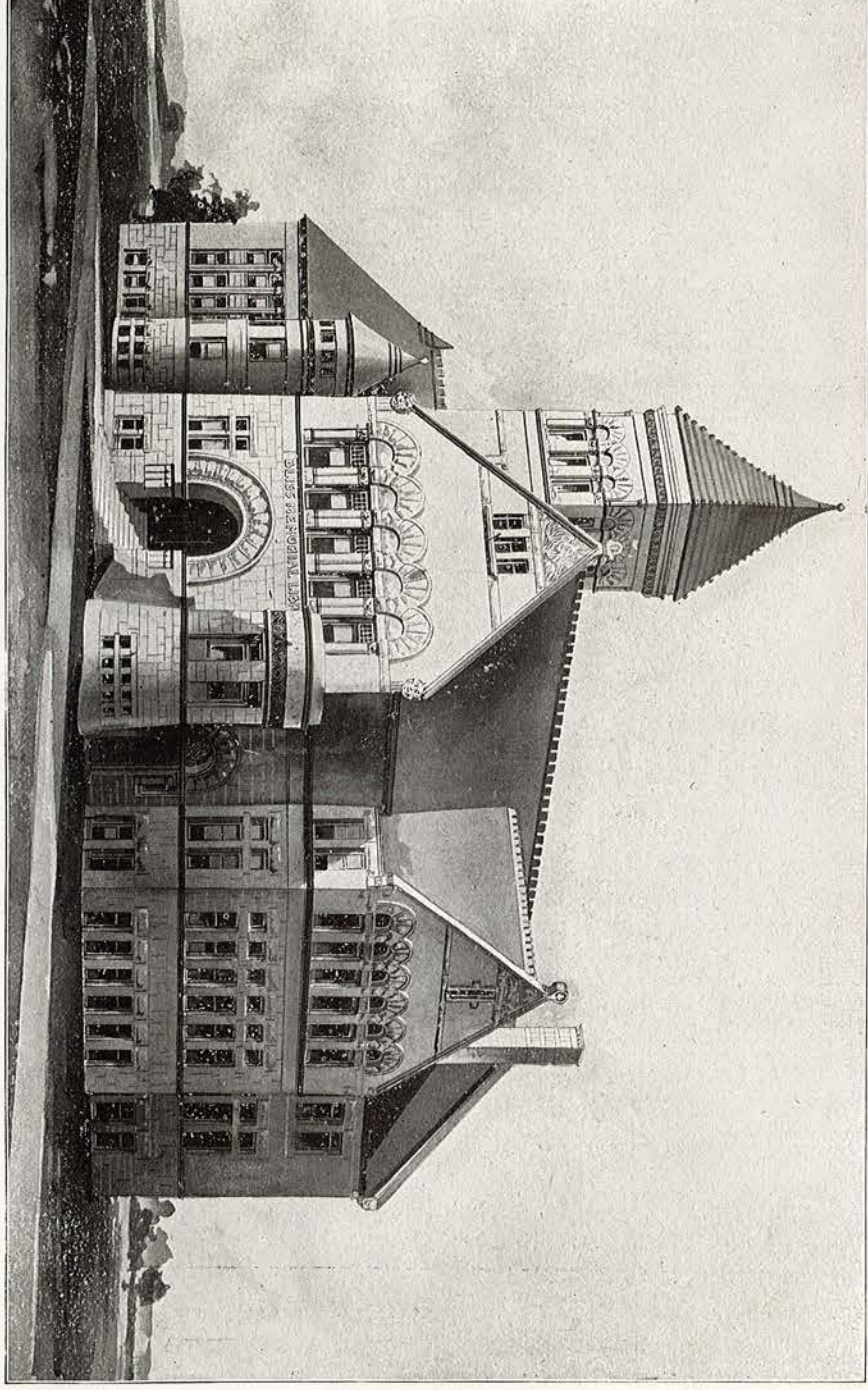
The attendance has increased steadily each year. In 1878 it was 204; in 1893, 627; the enrollment in all departments this year, '94-'95, will be more than of last. The number of bound volumes in the library at present is nearly 10,000. The institution though Methodist Episcopal in denomination is attended by many of other denominations.

Socially the college is well equipped. Several societies with large memberships have long been organized. Three secret college fraternities have Chapters established here, they being Alpha Tau Omega, Delta Tau Delta and Sigma Chi. The sororities here are Alpha Chi Omega, Delta Gamma and Kappa Alpha Theta. The college has from an early day supported a publication.

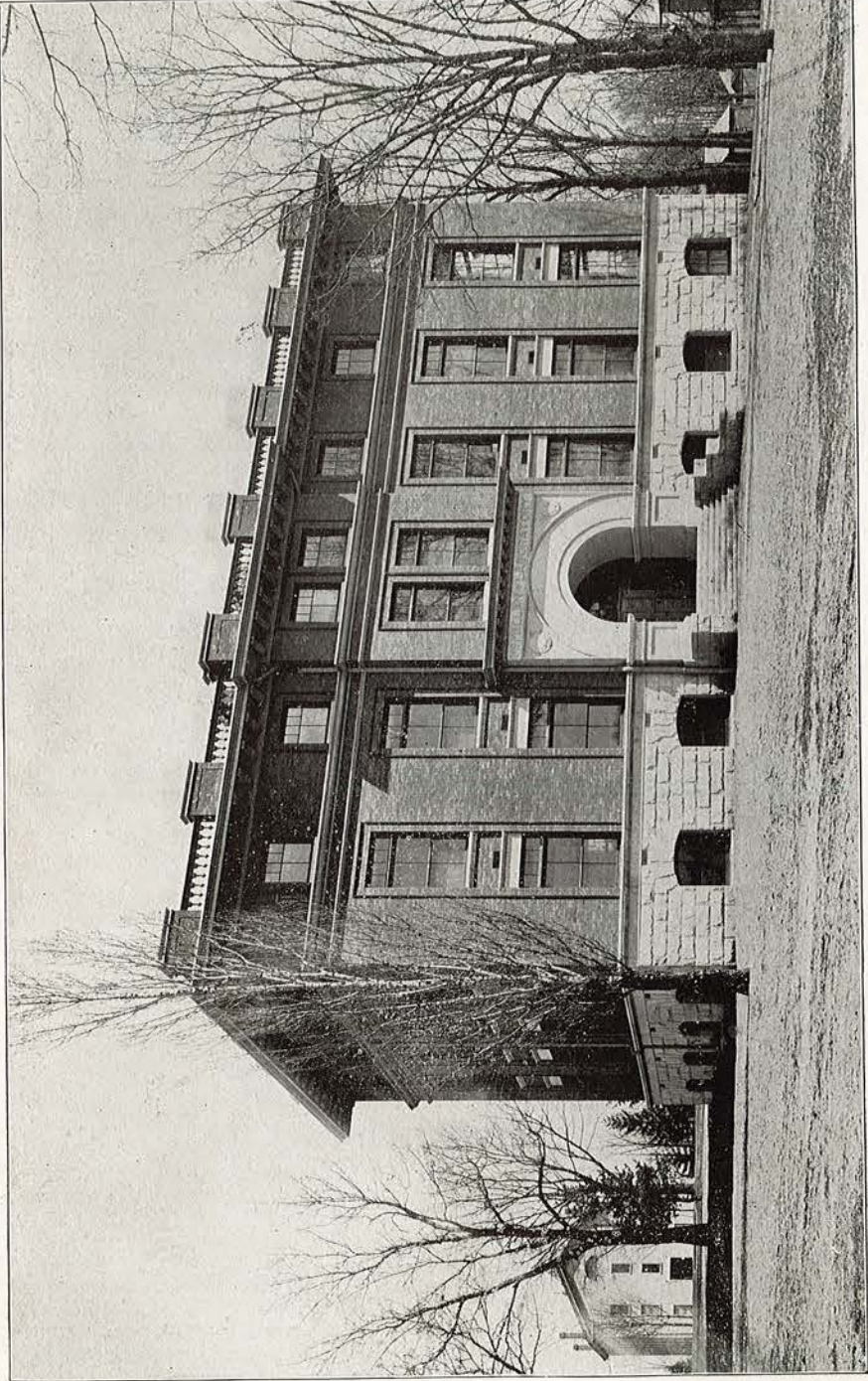
The Albion College Pleiad is a weekly paper conducted by the classes of the Literary Department. It is a folio of sixteen columns and is contributed to by students and alumnae of the college. It is managed by a stock company who elect every year a board of eight editors and two associates. These are chosen from the stockholders and are selected solely on account of their fitness for the position. The paper is largely patronized by the students, alumnae and townspeople. It has a weekly circulation of four hundred and fifty copies and its subscription list is constantly enlarging. It is universally recognized as one of the strongest college papers of the west, while its typography is as good as the best. Its exchanges number about one hundred, coming from all parts of the United States. Subscription \$1.00 per college year. Editor in-chief, 1894-95, Eugene C. Allen; business manager, A. J. 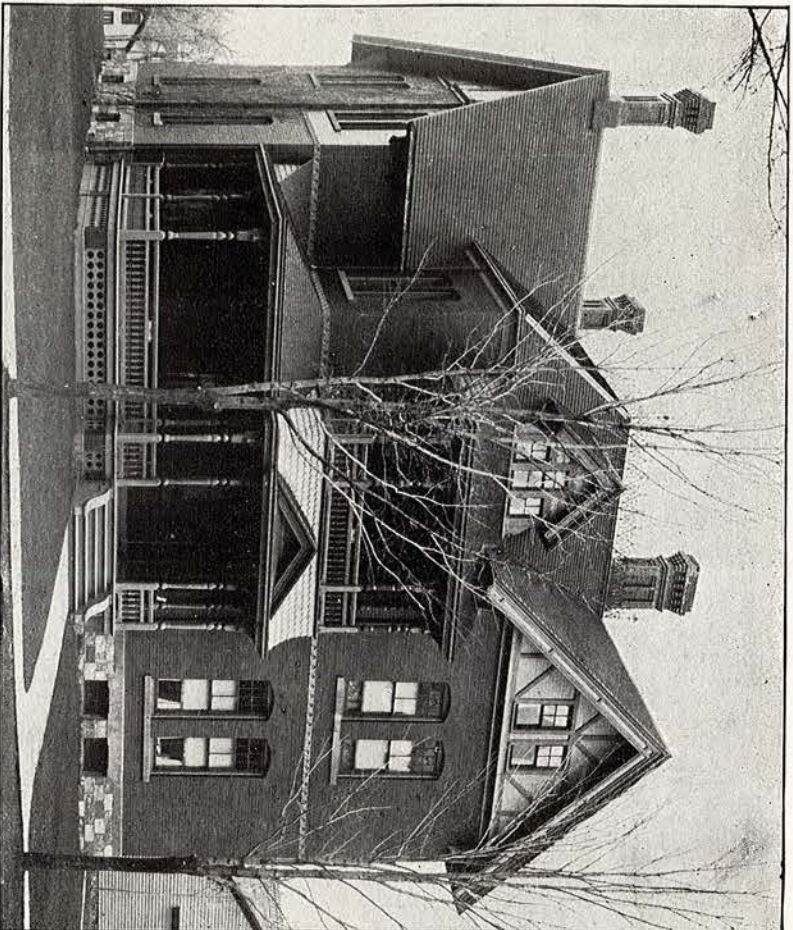
ALBION COLLEGE.—THREE ORIGINAL BUILDINGS.



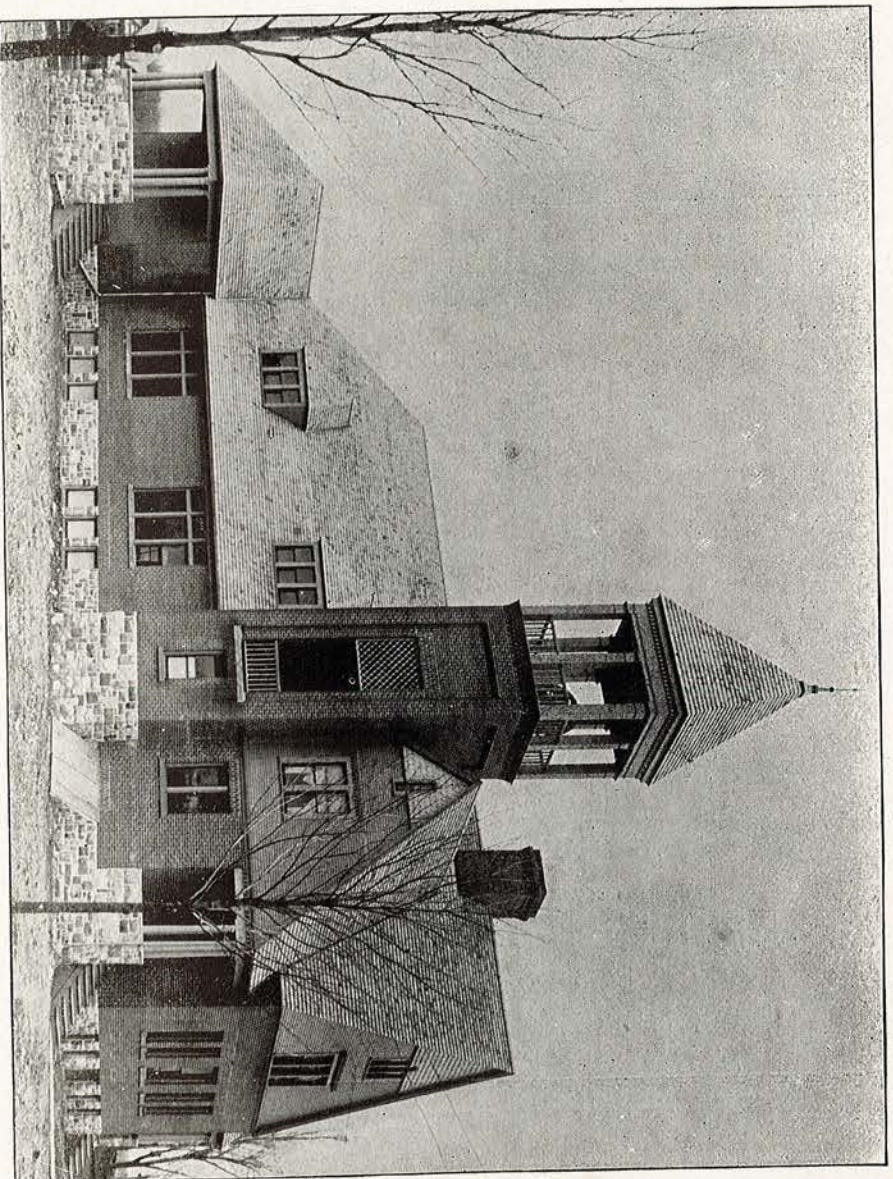
BLISS LIBRARY BUILDING.

THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS OF ALBION.

The first evidence of authentic history concerning schools in Albion is found to begin in the year 1836. During the summer of this year a school consisting of ten pupils, ranging in age from 5 to 17, was conducted by Mr. Henry Becker in a building erected by Jacob Devoe and originally intended for a barn. This structure was located near the spot now occupied by the Lake Shore freight house. Reading, writing, arithmetic and spelling were the branches taught.

In 1837 the citizens of the hamlet, for that Albion was in that early day, erected a building "on the lot next to the alley south of the German church." Its dimensions were about 20 by 26 feet, one story high, with a small tower in which was placed the bell that called together the pioneer pupils of Albion. The contractor was Warham Warner and he, assisted by Messrs. Crittenden and Bliss, had the building ready for occupancy early in the fall of that year. A Mr. Morgan, "a good man, a thorough teacher and very strict," conducted this school, which numbered 30 in attendance. The building at this early day was used often by all religious denominations as a place of worship.

In the winter of 1840 Wm. V. Morrison was pedagogue-general. The attendance had suddenly increased to nearly 100. His hands were full looking after the boys, for in those days they were a trifle rough and uncouth. He was equal to the emergency, as he very

plainly showed by his method of chastisement of all the unruly ones. In short to describe it, he had a bench about two feet high and under the bench the preceptor would put the ones guilty of misdemeanors. His method of getting them under was to shove their heads beneath the seat and then with the ruler he easily induced the guilty one to get the remainder of his anatomy out of sight under the bench in a minimum space of time.

In 1843 or 1844 the district now known as the north ward was organized, but it was not until 1850 that the school building at the north end of the park was built. This was a two story building, the primary grades being on the first floor and the more advanced on the second. The school opened in the fall of 1850 with L. S. Stevens as instructor. Physiology and grammar were introduced at this stage and to the observer at that time it must have seemed "like putting on a lot of airs."

In the east district the first school building was erected in 1844, it being a small wooden building 18 by 25 feet. In 1859 the structure having become too small for the purpose it was serving, a new edifice was put up, constructed of brick. The first instructor was Mr. Van Aiken. He taught, beside the branches formerly introduced, algebra and higher arithmetic. Albion grew and the school population having increased so rapidly that in 1867 the three district schools were not adequate to accommodate the numbers, the question of consolidation was brought up before the voters of Albion. After long and serious discussions and an endless amount of trouble, the matter was settled and the present school system of the city was the result. The ladies voted on this question and the fact is attributed to them of having caused all to end harmoniously and well.

Tuesday evening, September 19, 1867, a meeting of the legal voters of the village met in Howard's Hall and the first board of trustees were elected. They were Phineas Graves, A. M. Fitch, Augustus Gale, Samuel Irwin, Chas. Dalrymple and Wellington Bidwell. That fall, 1867, was the commencement of the graded school system of this place. The primary grades occupied the district school buildings and the higher ones were quartered in the old Presbyterian church, which stood on the southwest corner of Clinton and Erie streets.

In 1869 the north, east and south ward buildings were erected, costing \$2,600 each. The west ward was erected in 1873. In the spring of 1869 the church was sold and the old engine house was

then used for recitation rooms by the higher grades. The main part of the central school building was erected in 1872 at a cost of \$25,000. In Oct., 1877, the central was partly burned; total loss, \$1,791 50. On the morning of Nov. 5, 1879, the structure was again partly burned, the loss being about the same as in the former instance. It was ready for occupancy again Dec. 8. In 1885 a special charter was granted to the schools by the legislature. During this year the east and west wings were built at an expense of \$9,000. May 2, 1893, ground was broken for two more wings. These were constructed at a cost of \$7,900.

The first superintendent was F. B. McClellan, he holding his position from 1872 to 1877. Superintendent Thompson was Mr. McClellan's successor. He remained 10 years. Supt. W. C. Hull, the present incumbent, has been in charge of the schools since 1887. Albion, without doubt, is the only city in the state, or perhaps all of the states, that has had but three superintendents in twenty-two years to govern its public schools.

In 1889 the high school was placed on the list of recognized schools by Albion College, so that a graduate from the high school is allowed to enter the courses offered in the College without further examination. The University of Michigan recognized the school in one course at this time also.

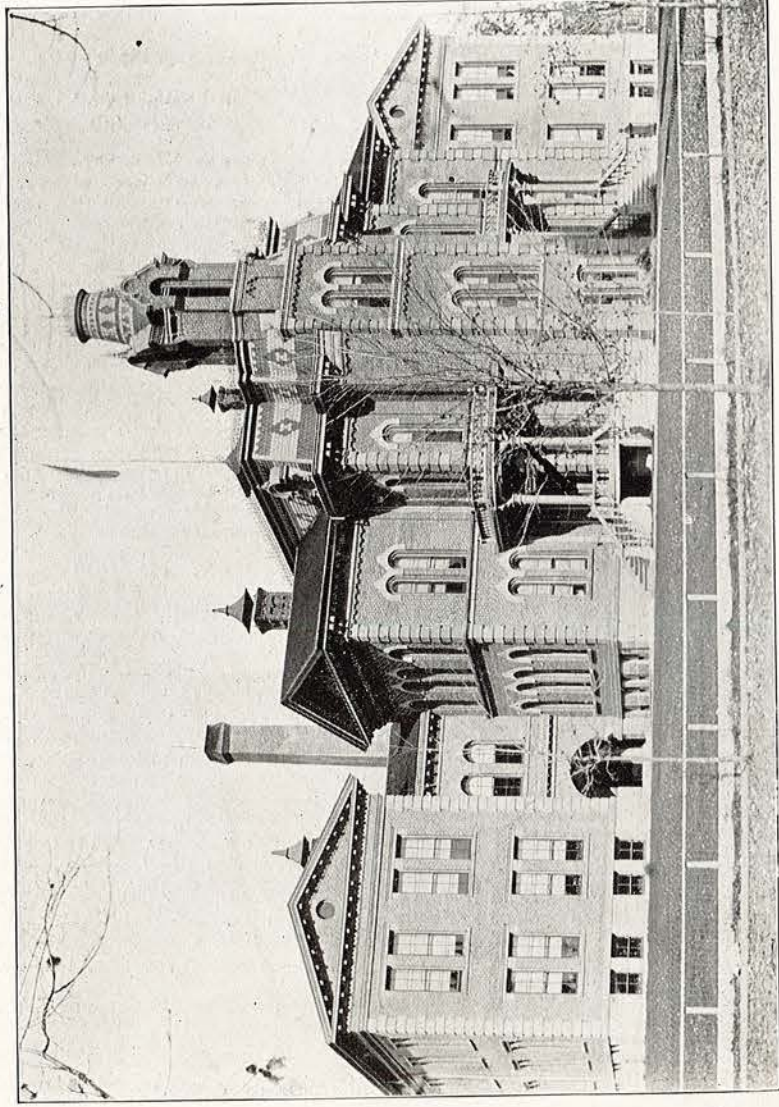
The policy of the school has always been progressive. At no time has politics or selfish purpose controlled the elections and as a result the members of the Board of Education have been free to act in harmony and according to the best educational policy of the day. Some of the changes which have been made within the past five or six years are: The addition of a year to the high school, making the course four years, which is the time required in all the leading high schools and which placed the school on the University and College lists; the introduction of Latin and German; laboratory work in physics and chemistry; the departmental plan of work in the high school; music throughout the schools under a special teacher; drawing in the grammar and primary grades under a special teacher. Kindergarten devices are used as busy work to some extent in the primary grades, and perhaps as important an advancement is the policy of placing as trained and skillful teachers in the lower as in the upper grades. A well equipped chemical laboratory for the accommodation of twenty-four students, furnished with the necessary appliances for individual experimenting, was added during the past year. Two additions containing two rooms each, and a boiler house for steam heating are used this year for the first. The growth of the school is uniform and healthy, the enrollment having increased one half in the past seven years, rendering necessary the addition of eight new teachers. The continued success of the school is insured by the wisdom of the people of Albion placing in control such a list of school officers as the following: Hon. C. F. Austin, president; Prof. Delos Fall, secretary; Mr. C. W. Dalrymple, treasurer; Dr. Mrs. F. E. Palmer, Jno. G. Brown, trustees.

Warren C. Hull, superintendent of the public schools of Albion, of whom a fair engraving of his likeness appears at the beginning of this article, was born at Constantine, Mich., May 20, 1860. His father, Hon. L. F. Hull, has been editor of the St. Joseph County Advertiser for over forty years, was for many years assessor of internal revenue and was collector of internal revenue during Grant's second term. Warren C. was the third of five children, all of whom received common school and secondary education in the high school of their native town, from which the subject of this sketch was graduated June, 1881. Having taught a district school during the winter of 1880-81, he was given a position as teacher in the seventh and eighth grades in his home school, where he remained one year, resigning to attend the State Normal at Ypsilanti. From that institution he was graduated June, 1884, as president of his class of over one hundred students and was one of ten chosen by the faculty to represent the class at commencement. During the next three years he was principal of the Birmingham union school, and is now serving his eighth year as superintendent of the public schools of Albion.

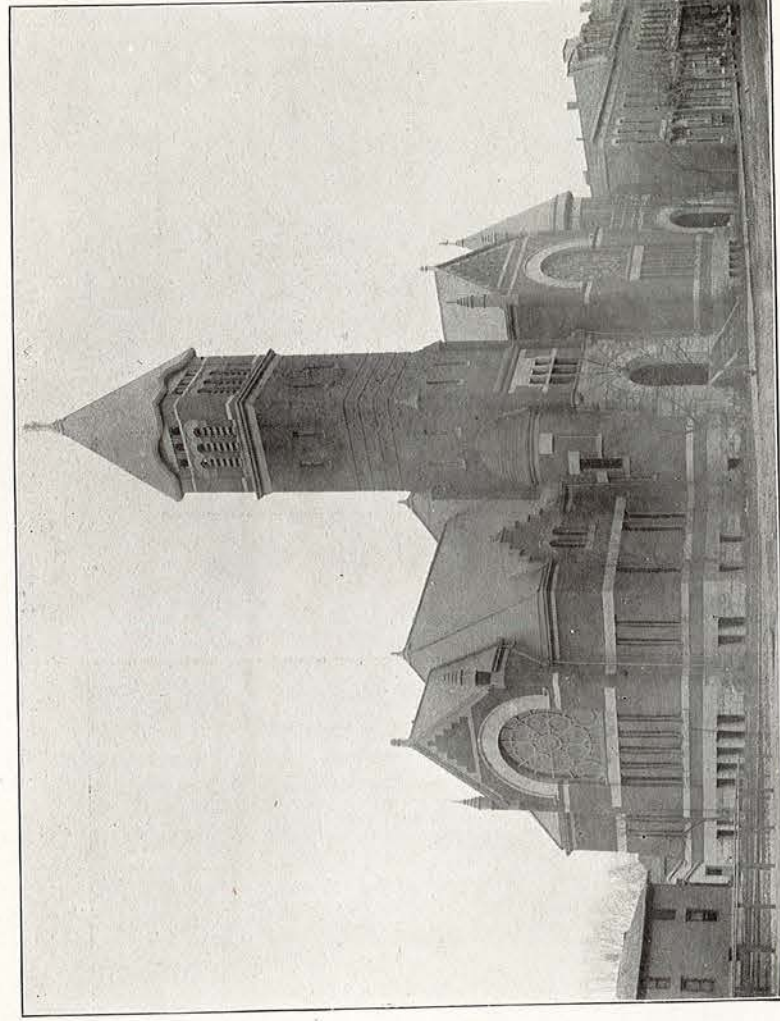
The state legislature having enacted a law authorizing the Normal to grant degrees in pedagogics, Mr. Hull was one of the first class, 1891, to receive the degree of Bachelor of Pedagogy, he having passed the examination required for this degree. The following year Albion College conferred upon him the degree of Bachelor of Philosophy for work done on the University plan.

Mr. Hull was married Aug. 11, 1886, to M. Louise McGill, who was his classmate at the Normal and fellow teacher in Birmingham high school. Mrs. Hull is a superior woman, a trained and gifted teacher and is a most valued help to her husband. They have three children, Helen, Frederick and Warren.

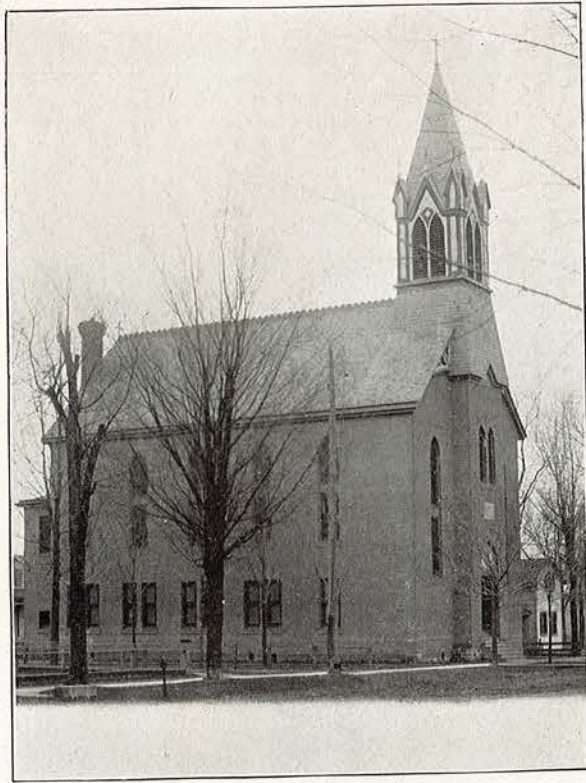
Mr. Hull considers the home the most sacred place where the energies of character are first set in operation, yet looks with reverence upon the mission of the public school.

METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH.

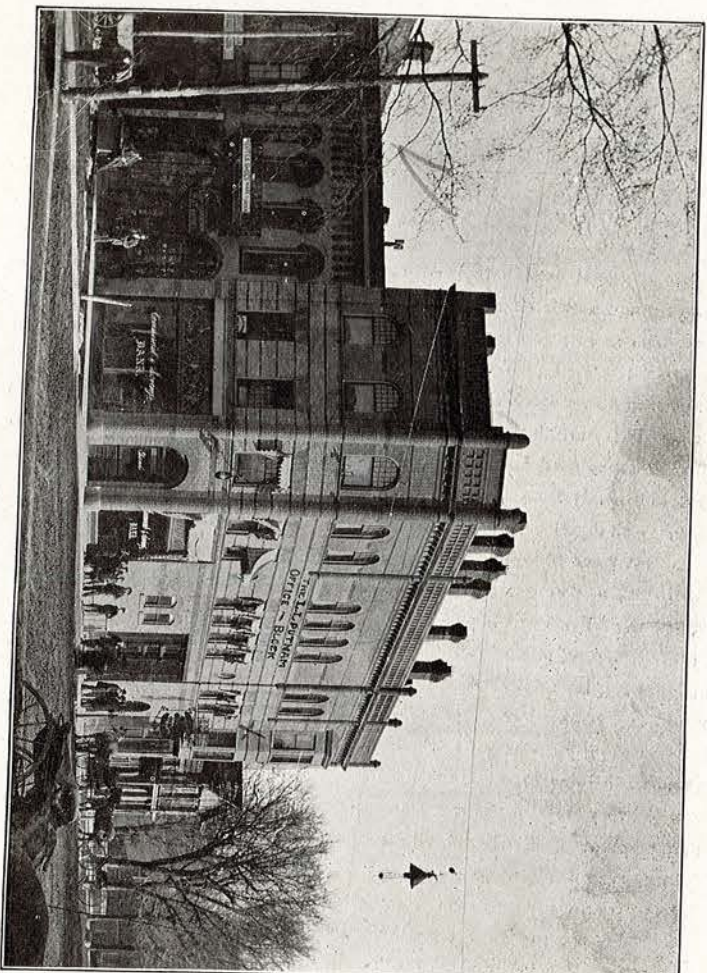


BAPTIST CHURCH.

THE ALBION MILLING COMPANY.

The flour manufacturing industry has always been one of importance in Albion. This was due, in an early day, to the fact that the surrounding country from the early pioneer period had always been a large wheat producing district and in the earlier days Albion's flouring mills were up to the times with any in the state.

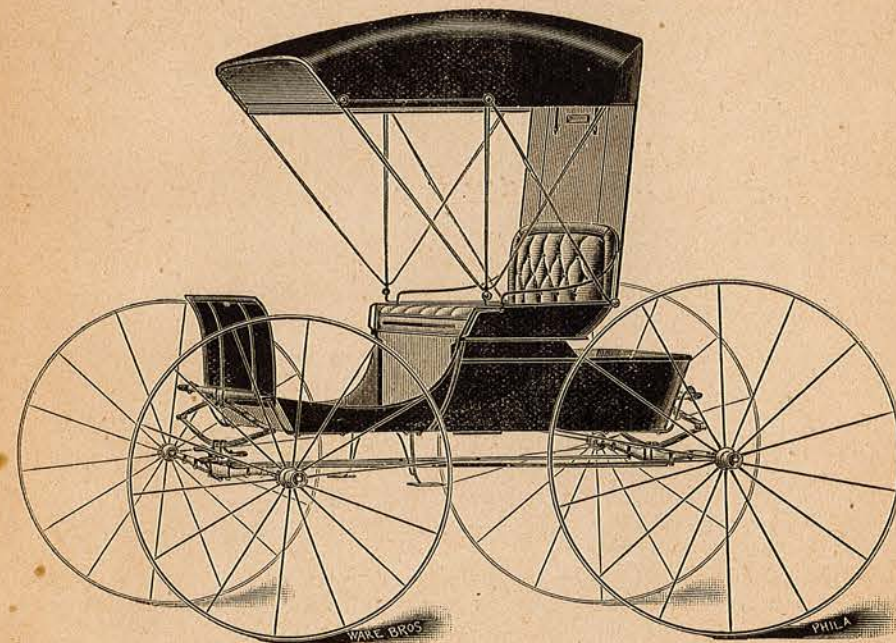
The first ground cereal used here was made by pounding corn in a large mortar, the product turned out being termed meal. This method was the first one used and lasted for a short time. A company of capitalists known as the Albion Company erected a grist mill which was in running condition in September, 1837. The old fashioned stone process was used. In 1845 the stone flouring mill on South Superior street was built by J. Crowell, I. Frost and Charles Rice, the firm being known as I. Frost & Co. This building was built in the most substantial way for the purpose for which it was designed. The stone used in its construction was partly quarried from a bed of sandstone lying a mile southeast and partly from stone found on section 19, township of Parma, about five miles distant. This property changed hands in 1878, being then purchased by the Geo. T. Smith Purifier Co. of Jackson, Mich. It later became the property of Mr. Chas. Knickerbocker of Jackson and lastly passed into the hands of the present proprietor, W. B. Knickerbocker, the plant being conducted under the name of the Albion Milling Company. Since the earlier days a complete revolution has been wrought in the method of "grinding wheat." This company has always been provided with the best equipment procurable. Albion has had the rudest as well as the best processes, from the wooden mortar to the present establishment of the Albion Milling Company. Instead of purchasing wheat necessary to purchase it in carload lots from abroad. Four hundred barrels every 24 hours are turned out and shipped to every state in the union and to points in Canada, Mexico and Europe. So popular and prominent is he that he was made mayor of the city by the choice of the republicans of the city at the spring election of 1894, and in public affairs as in private business he very evidently is master of the situation.

THE GALE MANUFACTURING COMPANY.

Something over a half century ago the little village of Moscow, in Hillsdale county, Michigan, awoke from its rural slumbers to the fact that plows were actually being made in their very midst. Two of its inhabitants, Mr. Geo. Gale and his son, Mr. O. C. Gale, were the authors of the conception and immediately began bringing this into material shape.

This was not the time of improved machinery. There was not even a sawmill in Hillsdale county. These hardy, enterprising men went into the woods, felled the trees, hewed out the beams, handles and standards, thence returned and cast the remainder of the plow; a little rough in appearance, but honestly built and of the best material obtainable. These crude implements justly received all praises. This marked an era in the growth of a mammoth concern. To this day the Gale Manufacturing Company make only the finest grade of implements, the best that honest workmanship and materials can produce.

Ten years later O. C. Gale sold his interests at Moscow and started another factory in connection with his brother, N. B. Gale, which was in operation for two years, when the latter sold his interest to A. J. Gale. They continued until 1861, when O. C. Gale transferred his interests to Horatio Gale.

In 1864 the factory was removed to Albion, when a co-partnership was formed with O. C. Gale and E. W. Hollingsworth. In 1868, on account of the lack of adequate quarters, they erected a substantial two story brick building on the site now occupied by the Albion Malleable Iron works. Additions were frequently made and the capital increased from time to time, when in July, 1887, the stock was purchased by a company represented by the following board of directors: H. K. White, president; Horatio Gale, vice president; F. A. Alsdorf, secretary and treasurer; H. R. Stoepel, general agent; A. J. Gale, superintendent; Geo. H. Gale and E. C. Lester. Having great faith in their plows and knowing that honesty in handicraft and materials would surely win, they continued with renewed vigor, and brought out their celebrated "Big Injun" three-wheel sulky plow which was patented March 20th, 1887, the phenomenal sales of which continue to increase each year.

In March, 1888, the Company was doing such a volume of business that they became once more crippled for want of room and capacity. They applied to several towns for inducements for location. Albion aroused itself and showed its hand. The city held mass meetings and decided to bond itself for \$30,000, with which amount they purchased the plant on condition that the Company remain in Albion. They therefore purchased a large tract of land (seventeen acres) in the western portion of city and erected their present plant.

The buildings are handsomely and substantially built of brick, the longest of which is one thousand feet. They cover over two hundred and fifty thousand square feet of floor space and are all one story in height, being nicely arranged so that crude materials are continuously and gradually formed into complete implements, which find themselves in a warehouse having a capacity of loading four trains at once. Every part of the plant is lighted by electricity, which is generated by their own electric plant. Their means of prompt transportation are unsurpassed, being tracked on every side by the Michigan Central and the Lake Shore and Michigan Southern railroads.

A neat two-story structure of brick with mansard roof sets off the foreground of the plant. This is the home office of the company. It is tastily fitted in antique oak and beautifully carpeted and furnished.

In 1890 they purchased the patents, licenses, patterns, etc., of the Albion Manufacturing Company, thus obtaining the right to make and sell its lines of harrows, cultivators and rakes; and in

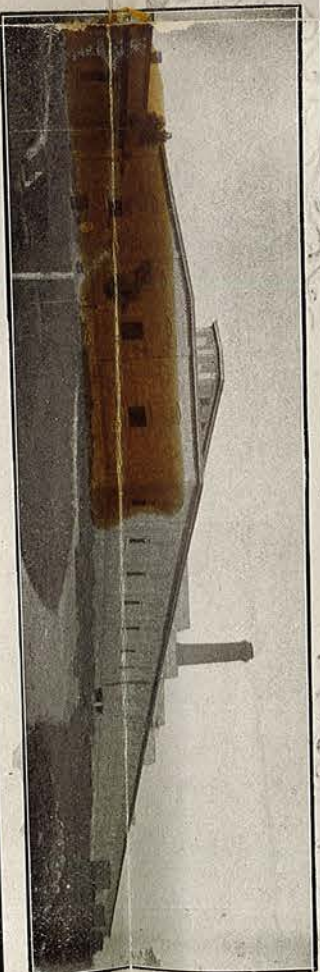
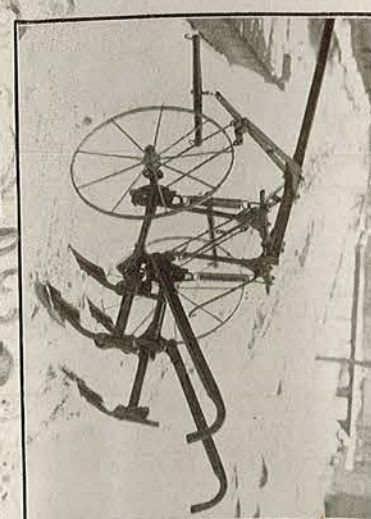
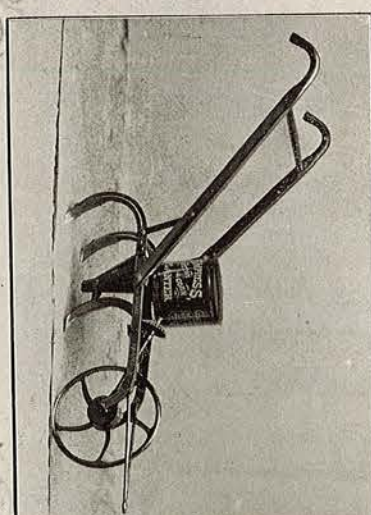
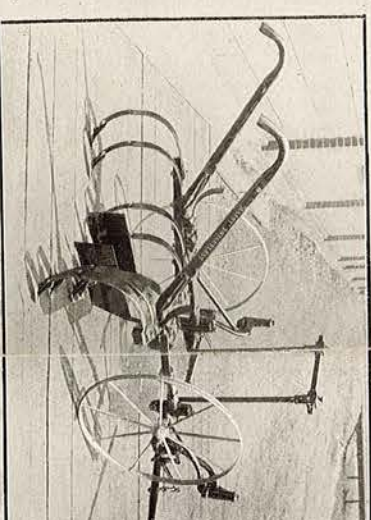
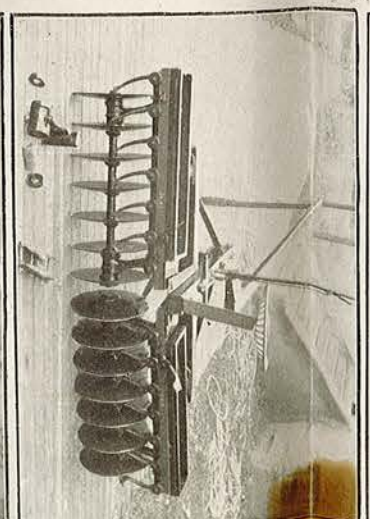
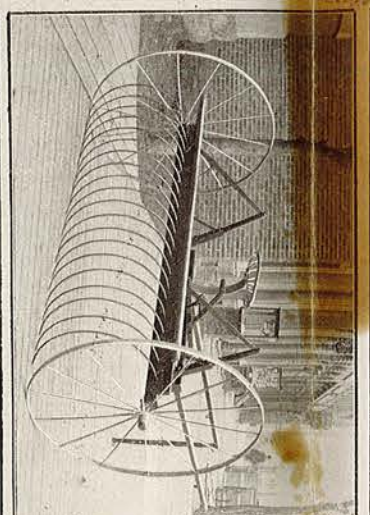
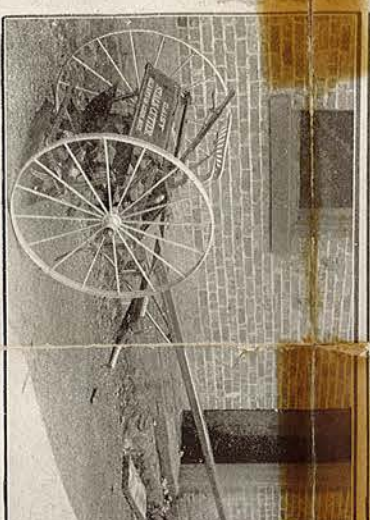
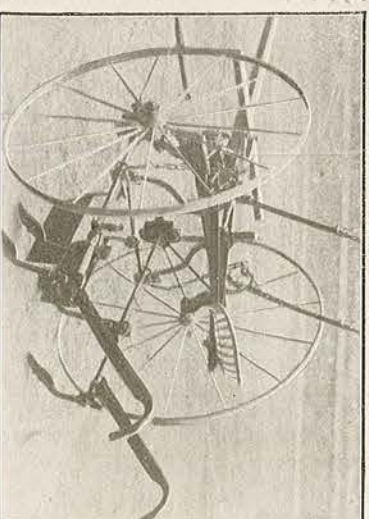
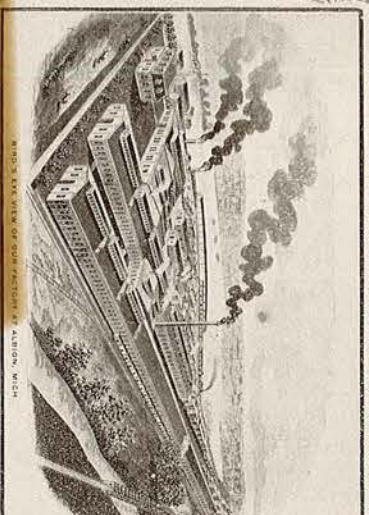
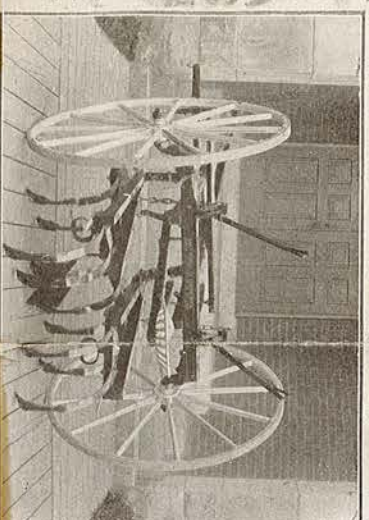
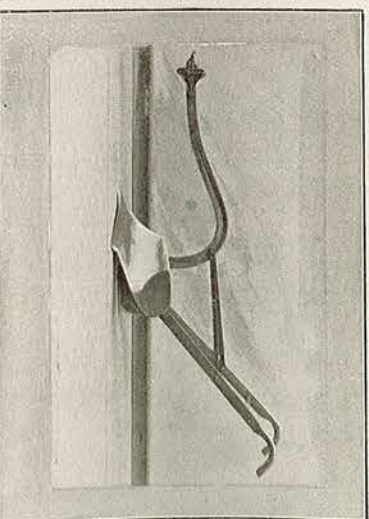
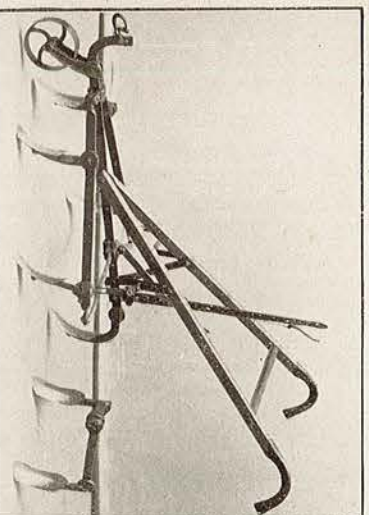
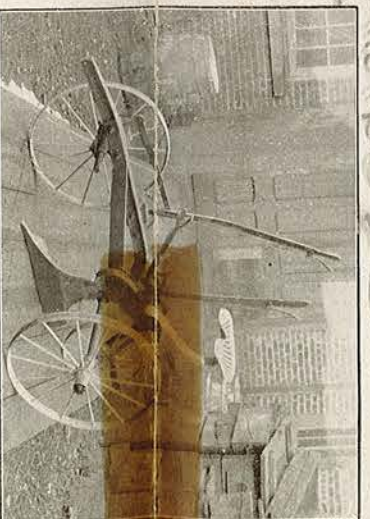
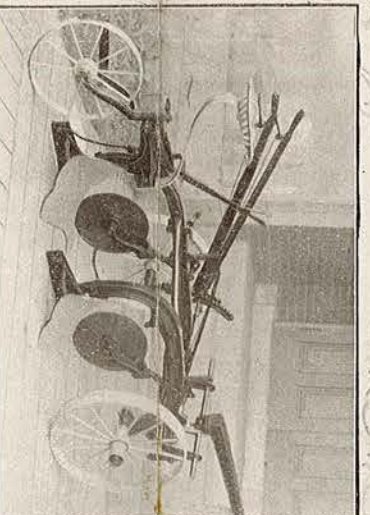
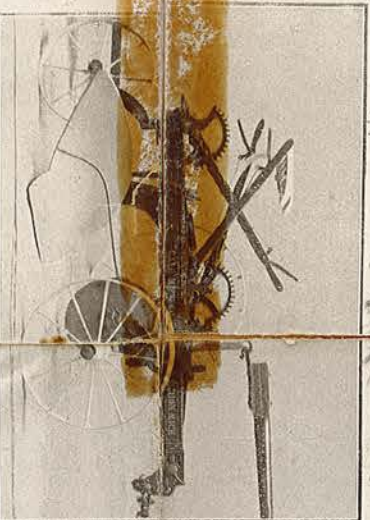
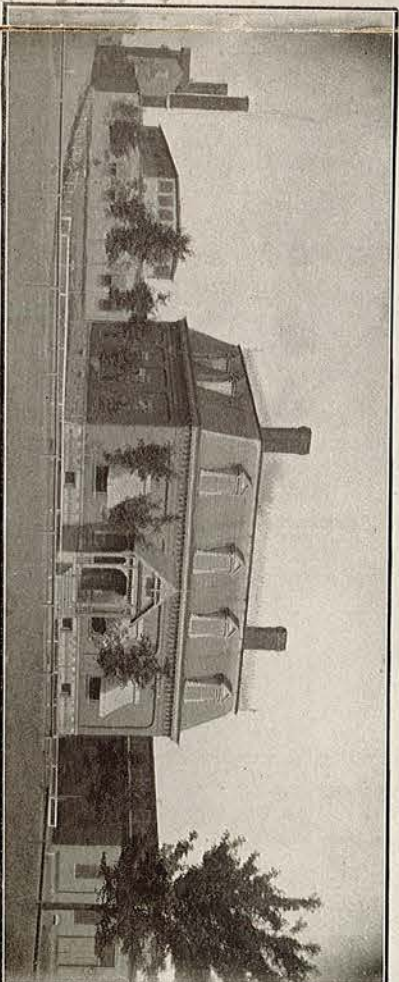
1892 they purchased from the Star Implement Company of Flint, Michigan, the patents, licenses, patterns, etc., coming into possession of its line of Star one-horse cultivators.

In 1890, when their line was augmented Mr. Horatio Gale became vice president, but upon his decease in 1892, Mr. A. E. F. White was chosen his successor. The officers at present are: H. K. White, president; A. E. F. White, vice president; H. R. Stoepel, secretary and treasurer; E. C. Lester, superintendent.

Since their foundation the Gale Manufacturing Company have built over three hundred and twenty-five different styles of walking, riding and gang plows, but this is only one line out of many they make. At present they are making the following lines and increasing them each month: All kinds of riding, walking and gang plows, made of steel, chilled iron or a combination of both; nine styles of two-horse riding cultivators; ten styles of two-horse walking cultivators; five styles of combined two-horse riding or walking cultivators; five styles of one-horse cultivators; nine sizes of disc harrows; ten styles of hay rakes; spring tooth lever harrows; spike tooth lever harrows; cotton and corn planters; stalk cutters; bean harvesters; broadcast seeders; grass seeders; hitching posts and stepping blocks, etc., etc.

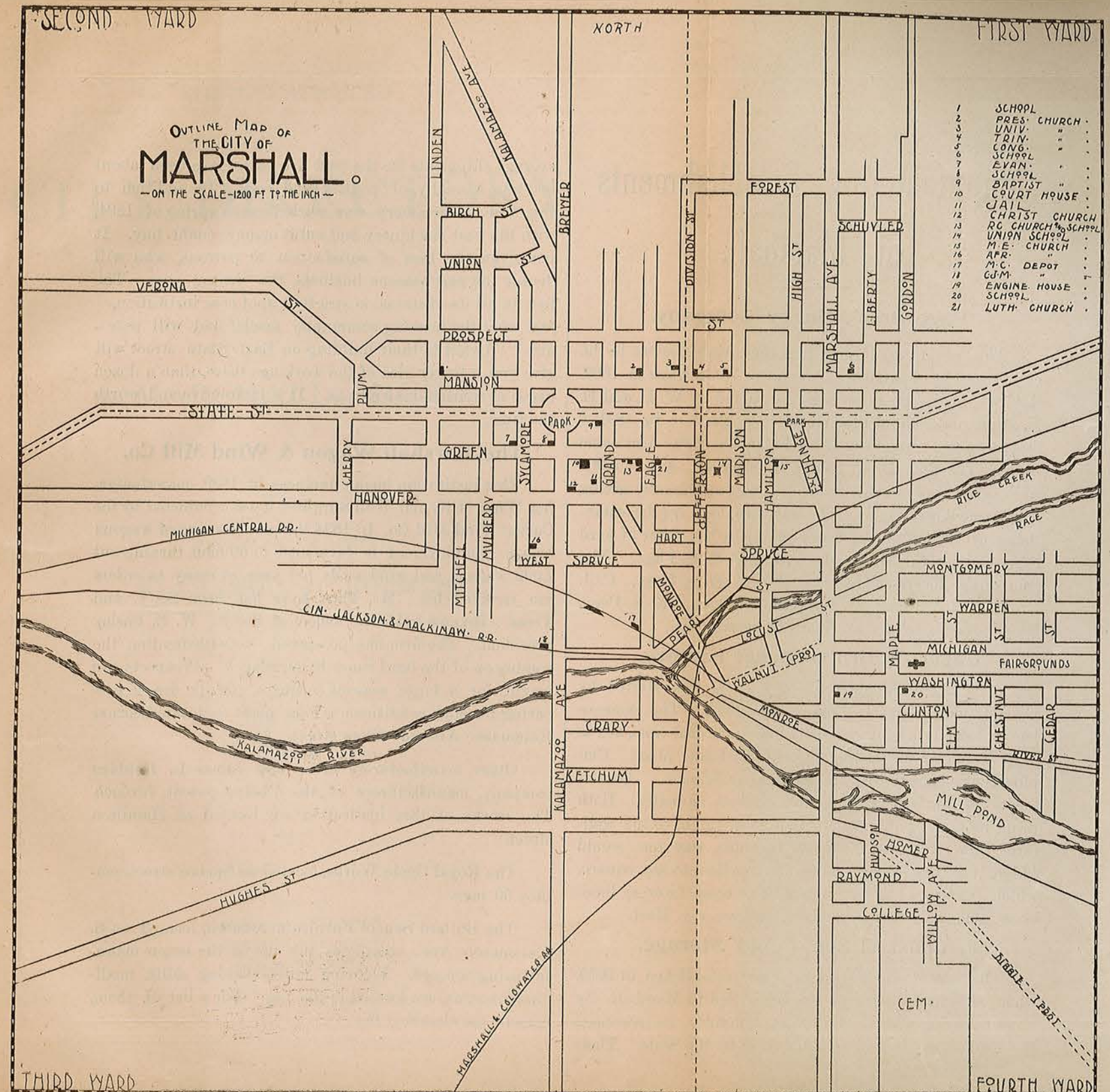

Manufacturing Establishments of Marshall.

Page Bros'. Buggy Company.

This plant, the largest manufacturing concern in the city, grew out of what was begun by W. L. Page in 1869. Afterwards the business was conducted by W. L. and E. E. Page, under the firm name of Page Bros'. In 1891 a stock company was formed for \$50,000, and the firm name became The Page Bros'. Buggy Company. About 5,000 high grade (only) vehicles are turned out annually giving employment to 75 men. The business done by the establishment to day, has been built up by the years of hard labor and careful study of W. L. and E. E. Page. The company's officers at present are W. L. Page, Pres., C. J. Cronin, Vice Pres.; J. R. Bently, Treas.; E. E. Page, Secy. Works located on South Kalamazo Ave.

Edgerton Bro's. Casket Factory.

A factory for manufacturing caskets was started by Geo H., and Sidney L. Edgerton, in 1887. The concern has increased its business many fold since that time, and to day it is one of the leading industries of the place. Employment is steadily furnished to 40 or 50 men. The capacity of the works are 6,000 caskets annually. Both proprietors are public spirited citizens, and have the well-fare of the city at heart. In a business way one would judge, that they are agreeable, and needless to say, square, which is always one testimonial of success in every business. The works are located on Jefferson cor. Hart.

J. Court & Son,—Cold Storage.

The firm of J. Court & Son, was established in 1879, when nothing in their line was conducted in Marshall. By honest dealing with the farming community, its patronage has made it the largest establishment in the State. Their

average shipments for the past five years have been about 500 tons annually, of poultry and eggs. In addition to this line, a creamery was started in the spring of 1894, with the best machinery and outfit money could buy. It has given the best of satisfaction to patrons, who will double the past seasons business the coming year. The firm in all its business, is strictly a spot case institution,—just what the farming community needs, and will patronize. A visit to their building on East State street will give you a better idea of the workings there, than a dozen pages of written descriptions. It is instructive and worth the time.

The Marshall Wagon & Wind Mill Co.

This institution began business in 1889, manufacturing Wind Mills and Well Supplies, it was conducted by the Carver Wind Mill Co. In 1894 the manufacture of wagons began. Employment is furnished to 50 men, turning out 2,000 wagons, and wind mills per year, as many as orders are received for. Mr. Thos. Eyre has been Sec'y. and Treas. He now holds the office of Sec'y. W. E. Bosley president. The firm has prospered, notwithstanding the coming on of the hard times in its infancy. Prospects are bright for a large seasons business, and the firm is preparing for such conditions. This plant is located corner Kalamazoo Ave. and State street.

Other manufacturers are: The James L. Dobbins company, manufacturers of the Phelps patent furnace. The works of this institution are located on Hamilton street.

The Royal Cycle Works, located on Spruce street, employ 50 men.

The Bullard School Furniture concern, located on S. Kalamazoo Ave., completes the list of the larger manufacturing concern. Flouring mills, planing mills, medicine concerns, are located in the city. For a list of them, consult the classified list.

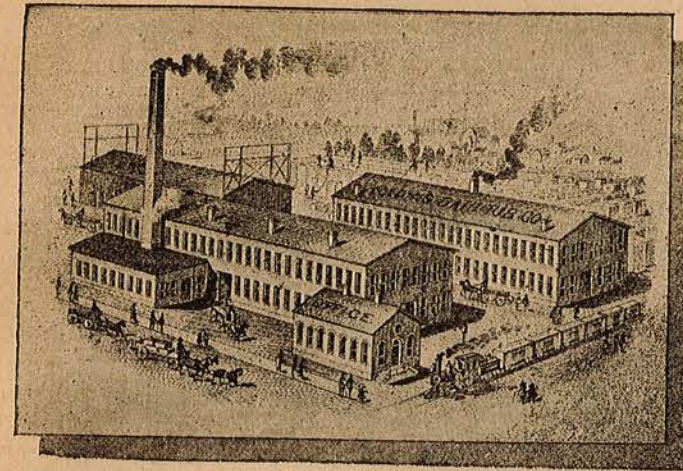

CITY OF MARSHALL.

TO give anything like a complete historical article on the development of Marshall, would require space many times the size of a volume such as this and to attempt it would be practically impossible in this work, whose principal feature is merely one of a directive nature rather than a writeup historigue.

The apology offered for inserting it, is not that it is the first and original, nor that it fills a long felt want in any manner whatsoever: for the facts have been related heretofore in various articles and publications, and in this respect, have become well familiarized: but, owing to its concise and limited review from the first instance of settlement by pioneers up to the present including sketches of the several industries, professions and business pursuits in the place, with their particular historical data given, make it a story, giving more completeness to the publication and perhaps by the way in presenting facts, may lend to the subscribers some information worthy of memorization, and a better (historically speaking) idea of this hustling, growing, inland city, Marshall, Calhoun County, Michigan.

The city in size comprises about four and one half square miles, its location being upon what was once a wooded highland and partly the lower part a whortleberry swamp on the north banks of the Kalamazoo river, the elevation being about 60 feet above Lake Michigan; the water supply lies in a bed of gravel 25 to 30 feet below the surface and furnishes an inexhaustible supply of the purest water. Marshall, long years ago, 1831 received its name, it being christened in honor of the then Chief Justice of the United States by that old pioneer, the late Sidney Ketchum, a much respected acquaintance of Chief Justice Marshall.

Previous to 1829 the present site of Marshall was a wooded ridge together with a swamp the higher lands around about being beautiful, in the extreme. Fires periodically kindled by the Indians, cleared away the grass and brushwood, when these would become littery and troublesome, and thus in the early springtime, a beautiful verdure, enameled with lovely flowers, among which large trees, at intervals spread out their branches to present a refreshing, shade, gave to the place the appearance of a park to the eye of the first civilized person to set foot within these limits. Up to this time (1829) nature held full sway in these regions for miles around, a few log huts at Jackson and a few more at Kalamazoo, forming the neighborhood. The only indication of human beings were those of the children of the forests, who built their camp fires on the hills and fished along the stream. The only road was the Indian trail, narrow but well beaten, worn by the traffic of ages. One by one in single file, on horses or on foot, had the "big Injuns" been wont to pass on their way along this trail perhaps for centuries. Here in this neighborhood they held their council congregating at the summons of their chieftain, here their war cries resounded to the echos long since died away, and nothing now is left of the Pottawatomies of 70 years ago save the fading recollections of the oldest pioneers and the vague imaginations of later generations.

Less than 70 years ago the school geographies proclaimed Michigan to be a swamp, illy adapted for settlement. The explorations of Governor Cass, disproved this; and shortly thereafter the idea got abroad that it would grow rye and white beans.

In the summer of 1830 Mr. Sidney Ketchum started from Peru, Clinton county, N. Y., to explore what was then termed the West; after some deliberation he resolved to pay the territory of Michigan a visit. Being provided with letters of introduction to Governor Cass, he landed in Detroit in August; after obtaining all possible information, he proceeded into the interior toward Ypsilanti, following the old Indian trail which diverges from the "Chicago Turn Pike" near Ypsilanti, terminating at the mouth of the St. Joseph river and known as the "Territorial Road." From Ann Arbor, Mr. Ketchum proceeded west with two men who had some knowledge of the country; they found a few log houses at Jackson, which had just been erected. They pushed on untill they arrived at the junction of Rice Creek and Kalamazoo

River. There they stopped for a few days camping and exploring the region. Here a good water power was discovered, but the land although surveyed was not yet subject to entry. Purchasing up the "floating claims" of persons who had settled on unsurveyed land, he laid claims among several others upon a fractional quarter section at the junction of Rice Creek and the Kalamazoo river, embracing land since known as "Capitol Hill" and the water power on the Rice Creek and Kalamazoo at that point. A "floating claim" was also laid on land where Albion now stands. These were the first lands located in Calhoun County. The first parcel of land entered in the U. S. Land Office, in this county, was entered Oct. 15, 1830, by Nobel McKinstry, of Kalamazoo county, and was deeded to Sidney Ketchum, May 11, 1831.

In the fall of this same year, Isaac N. Hurd and Calvin Smith, the former a civil engineer, the other a lawyer, were roaming about the wilds of Calhoun county, trying to find a suitable point for location. Hearing that the lands at the junction of Rice Creek and Kalamazoo had been located, they concluded that in this locality would be the right place for a county seat. In conjunction with Hon. J. Allen, they procured "floating claims" and the triumvirate laid these claims on a map at a certain point between two eighties belonging to two different sections. This point was the site of the old court house of Calhoun county. Mr. Ketchum hearing of these transactions purchased Mr. Allen's interest in the proposed county seat, then returning to his New York home, to bring back with him his family to their new domain in the wilds of the Wolverine territory. In 1831, Messrs. Hurd and Smith, the owners of two-thirds of this county seat, procured a survey and platting of the same. The government required that ere a proclamation should be issued making this point the seat of justice of Calhoun county, that the following conditions should be adhered to; the relinquishment on the part of the owners of land for public use, of the streets, alleys, squares or lots for public buildings. Upon Mr. Ketchum's return from New York all these points were acceded to and Marshall was proclaimed by the Territorial Governor to be the seat of justice of Calhoun county. Among the properties and streets dedicated for public use were the court house square, and four church lots; one for the Presbyterian, one for the Methodist, one for the Episcopal and one for the Baptist, beside a seminary lot and a lot for the jail.

George Ketchum arrived here April 18, 1831, accompanied by Horace P. Wisner, Solomon M. Allen, White Ketchum, a cousin, John Kennedy, Larcum Ball and wife, six men and one woman; such was the commencement of Marshall, and with a beginning of so large a proportion of the male sex predominating, even within 60 years the weaker sex far outnumber the other and the question naturally arises at this rate, how soon hence, will it be when Marshall is a town of numberless females and not a single man? Sidney Ketchum returned in July with his family, consisting of his wife, five children, his parents and a young sister. Here in this true camp of the wilderness did this little band of men and women labor assiduously forming the earliest life and foundation of Marshall and preparing a way which has now lead to this thrifty city.

A saw mill was erected and in operation Sept. 3d, 1831, which was a great facilitating factor in providing building material for the first dwellings of the place (none of which are now extant).

From the fact that this place was selected as the county seat for Calhoun, many were attracted to the place and soon a hamlet of more than a dozen houses together with half a dozen shops constituted the young village. It is an interesting fact to state that all of these earliest settlers were educated people, of high strung sympathies, of lofty and cultivated sentiments, taking up their abode in the wilderness, facing the hardships and privations of a settler's life, wearing cheerful and contented countenances in unfloored and coarsely furnished log huts. The first settlers of Marshall, as of many other places, were men of intellect, education, refinement fixed on a site, when a few log huts at Jackson and Kalamazoo formed the neigh-

borhood. From this fact the observer can see that to it is due the rapid developement of this nation within the past three score and ten years.

There were trials to endure then which, by the metamorphosis of the region from the wilderness to a civilized community, have been eliminated. The district was a malaria laden one, this one fact alone was discouraging in the extreme. Then there was excitement to keep settlers wide awake nights in the shape of wild beasts. The surrounding wilderness was abundant with hungry wolves; anecdotes by the score and hundred could be related of the thrilling experiences which the earlier settlers had with the wolves and bears to fill a volume twice the size of this. Soon after the first settlement had been made the Indian got "on the warpath; death and destruction marks his track." Thus went the discomfiting alarm about the first of May 1833. As the colonists knew little of the belligerents the perplexities were all the more complex. A meeting was called for making arrangements for protection and to give the "big Injuns" what they were justly deserving of. A public meeting was called at the home of Mr. Pierce, presided over by Sands McCamley. The next morning, pursuant to resolutions approved on that memorable night, twelve men appeared armed with rifles, their blankets packed, and provisioned. They proceeded as far as Prairie Ronde, where they met Col. Daniels, military commander of the district. There they learned that the danger was more remote than at first reported, whereupon they returned to the village they had left the day before with only one man guarding it. Thus ended the famous "Black Hawk War" as regarded Marshall.

It had been an understood thing at the time the foundations of the city were laid, and contracts for public buildings, etc., attended to, that Marshall was to be the capitol of the state. In the appointments of advantages Ann Arbor was to be the seat of the state university, Jackson was to have the penitentiary and Marshall was to be named the capitol city. The bill fulfilling this pledge actually passed the senate by a majority of 14, but, as is reported, by influence it was thrown out of the Lower House, defeated by a majority of only two. Thus the reader will observe that with a change of two votes on the part of those brainy legislators in this bill how differently, "it might have been." Although this was a paralyzing set back to Marshall yet in a few years it grew with amazing rapidity. There was continued progress in intelligence and cultivation and strangers who visited it remarked with surprise the tokens of advanced refinement, of sentiment, of elegance of manner, of lady like dignified bearing that were observable in the log huts tenanted by the inhabitants of Marshall. There was a sort of fairy tale atmosphere around the place as though princesses in disguise were doing the work of Cinderellas and investing that work with the peculiar charm which educated and refined souls can throw over even the suds of the washtub. So far ahead was Marshall in point of learned men and refined and cultivated women that in the early history of the state it was second to Detroit in importance as a community. With so favorable a start and such roseate prospects did the place have that it only demonstrates how inland towns in the long run are handicapped in the race with their sister cities located on a water's edge.

Soon after the excitement had subsided from the reports of the Black Hawk War, another alarm was turned in, this time the cry being "Cholera." Isaac N. Hurd, one of the proprietors of the village, was the first stricken. A strong man as he was seen on the streets the day before, the evening of the following day he was writhing in the dreadful collapse of cholera. That night he died and to prevent further spread of the scourge his body was borne to the grave by torch light, this being the first interment ever made in Marshall. Several others followed and there was a scattering of inhabitants to distant points. Matters looked dreary just then for Marshall, but a day of sorrow is surely to be followed by one of joy, and such was the case in this instance—the panic was soon over and the village once more began to thrive.

True to their intuitions, education was among the cares of the first founders of Marshall. A Miss Brown was summoned from Ann Arbor to take charge of the literary instruction of the children of several of the families who were of suitable age. The number of pupils scarcely

reached a dozen and a sort of loft was the best school room that could be provided. An extended sketch on the public schools of Marshall is given elsewhere in this work.

The first hotel in the city was the Exchange, built by Samuel Camp in 1833, located about where Chas. Cook's grocery store now stands. Finally this was changed into stores and subsequently was destroyed by fire. The next one was the Marshall House built by Sidney Ketchum and a stock company a part of which is now occupied by Lewis Perrin as a residence, this being the west wing of that celebrated hostelry. The National hotel, now occupied by the Marshall Wagon and Windmill Company was erected previous to the Marshall House by Manlius Mann, and was conducted by him and others until 1887. Another Exchange hotel occupied the place where the Herndon is now located, built by Samuel Camp about 1844 and stood there until '50 when it was moved away. The Herndon, built by Wm. H. Brown, was erected in 1856. The Tremont House in the Eagle Block, was opened as the Witt House in 1875 and subsequently changed to the Tremont, and conducted as a hostelry until 1890. The Johnston House was first opened about 1870 by Daniel H. Way, he being followed by Mr. Whitcomb and he by Mr. Wm. Johnson. The Tontine was first opened by Mr. Cornelius Van Wyck in 1856. Wm. Johnson (not he of the Johnson House) succeeded him. It changed management several times, it now being in the hands of James J. Fahey.

The Forbes House, owned by the M. C. R. R. Co. and managed by Z. M. Lester from 1848 to '52; by S. P. Wormley from '52 to '57; by B. Banks until '61 or '62; then A. V. Pantland, now manager of the Morton House, Grand Rapids, conducted it until 1868, he being followed by Mr. Witt until '75. It was closed in 1889 after a remarkable existence of over 40 years. At present the city is supplied with two hosteleries; The Johnson House, A. D. Milham and Son, proprietors. The Herndon, A. E. Wright, proprietor. The former located on Eagle street, corner of Green, is wholly inadequate to provide for the large trade it enjoys, consequently the proprietors have made all arrangements and let contracts for a new three story building to be located on the site of the present house. This being completed Marshall will have one of the finest equipped hotels between Detroit and Chicago.

The first grist mill was erected in 1833, its location being on the present site of Perrin's mill on Rice Creek. Others that have been built since are: The Stone mill built in '36 by Ketchum Bros. This mill burned down four times and was finally abandoned by H. J. Perrin. It was located on Kalamazoo river east of Marshall avenue. Another built on the Kalamazoo river west of Marshall avenue by H. J. Perrin. This was burned twice and rebuilt once. At present there are four flouring mills. For a list of them and locations, consult the classified list of business firms.

The first white child born in the county was Helen M., daughter of Peter Chisholm, born Oct. 26, 1831; and the first white male child born in the county was Luther H., son of Gen. and Clarissa Hayes, born Jan. 17, 1832.

The first physicians to locate in the county to practice were Dr. Hart and A. S. Hayes. For a list of those practicing now in the city consult the classified list of business and professional men.

It was in the year 1835 that that wild spirit of speculation sprang up which altered the face of everything as it went on its reckless course. Immigration proceeded by rapid strides, town lots rose in value. Sidney Ketchum became agent for some Boston capitalists for the investment of nearly a quarter of a million of capital in western lands. He organized a company for the purchase of the property on "Capitol Hill," embracing the mills and water power. The spirit of speculation increased. Improvement throughout the county went forward vigorously. Not only Marshall began to build in the more solid material of stone and brick, but the primitive log dwellings of the county gave way to elegant and substantial ones. This state of things received a sudden check from the financial revulsions that occurred at about that time and some of the richest speculators were practically made aware of the uncertain timber on which earthly

property rests. During the time of the "boom" four banks were established. The Calhoun County Bank, with Sidney Ketchum as president, was one.

Other banks that have been organized since are: The Bank of Marshall, Horace Brace, president, located in the basement of the old court house, which stood in the present public park. Gorham's bank, conducted by Mr. Chas. T. Gorham from 1840 to 1865. After the inauguration of the national banking system in 1865, were organized, the First National bank with Mr. C. T. Gorham as president, its present president; the National City, organized about 1873 with Geo. W. Bentley, president. This bank closed its doors June 3d, 1891, owing to a heavy defaultification, \$113,000, by the assistant cashier, E. J. Kirby. The Commercial Savings bank, organized in 1893, with W. J. Dibble as president, completes the list.

The Michigan Central railroad was completed as far as Marshall in 1844, naturally giving an impetus to trade and improvement; this road was first owned and conducted by the State and finished by them to Kalamazoo in 1846. The road was purchased from the state by the Michigan Central Railroad Company which, with J. W. Brooks as superintendent managed the road until 1853; he being succeeded by Noyes, he by R. N. Rice. The road's division shops, round houses and division terminus was located here in 1847 and gave employment to fully 500 men. These were located on Kalamazoo avenue west of the present depot and occupied four acres of ground. Owing to the greediness of certain men in town by placing property at double valuation, which the company wished to buy, caused them to pull out of Marshall and settle in Jackson. Ever since then the Michigan Central has regarded Marshall in an exceedingly cold way in the matter of train service and every other respect.

The Cincinnati, Jackson & Mackinaw railroad ran its first scheduled train through Marshall in 1881. Its machine shops are located here, giving employment to nearly 100 men.

In the later history of Marshall, improved railroad lines are mentioned by chroniclers with varied frequency. E. G. Rusts' History and Directory of Calhoun County issued in 1869, devotes considerable space to the mapping of a route known as the Jonesville, Marshall & Grand River railroad. This company was organized in March 1867, Hon. S. S. Lacey being its first president. Its terminals were Greenville in the north and Jonesville in the south. The advantages of the line were described as being a direct communication with the great grain market of the west, Toledo. The company had the pledge of the Michigan Southern for its rolling stock as soon as it should be ready for its super-structure. "That powerful corporation" says Rust's History of Calhoun County "has an eye to the Northern Pacific railroad, and will make the Jonesville, Marshall and Grand River railroad a link on the iron arm it is stretching toward the straits of Mackinaw." It was the intention of the company to build the railroad from Jonesville to Olivet by Jan. 1, 1870. The city of Marshall voted ten per cent, (\$70,000) to the work and stood ready to vote by a special act of the legislature, \$75,000 more. But how often, especially in railroad enterprises, as illustrated in this instance, have the best laid schemes of men "gang aft a-glee."

The Peninsular Railway was another road, proposed by an organized company but never went further than drawings on paper. This line now runs from Jonesville to Lansing as a branch of the Lake Shore and Michigan Southern.

The first postoffice in Marshall was conducted by Mr. Geo. Ketchum in 1831. He appointed J. D. Pierce deputy postmaster, which office proved not to be a very onerous one at that time, since it is related of him that he kept the mail in the clock case at first and as the business increased, a cigar box was used as the depository of letters. The mail came about once a week at that time and was quite an exciting event for those isolated dwellers in log huts. Postmasters succeeding Mr. Ketchum are: Chas. D. Smith, who served five years; Jas. M. Parsons, '40-'44; Zenas Tillotson, '44-'48; Geo. S. Wright, '48-'52; John H. Montgomery, '52-'56; S. S. Lacey, Rev. H. A. Reed, S. J. Burpee, Wm. Lewis, S. S. Lacey, and S. F. Snyder. The present office is filled by Chas. T. Fletcher, appointed by President Cleveland in 1894. Mr. Lewis B. Albaugh is his most courteous and able deputy; Mrs. Maggie O'Leary and Geo. R. Fletcher are clerks.

Telegraph service was first introduced in 1844 from Detroit. The first office was in the

building located on the site of the S. E. Cronin block. Rates then were about the same as now. This method of rapid communication was a monopoly by itself until the invention of the telephone which was first put in service here in 1882, J. W. Fletcher being the first manager. The present office of the Michigan Bell Telephone Company is in the store and under the management of Will T. Drake, 240 State street. A long distance metallic circuit telephone line is now being put in and will reach here and be in operation about February 1st. The local office will be managed by W. T. Drake. Expressage is all transacted through the American Express Company under the management of F. W. Dunn at 225 State street. This office was established here in 1844.

Among the incidents which are visited with a very peculiar interest, is one concerning the recapture of slaves, which is well remembered by many citizens of Marshall. In 1845 or '46 there was an alarm given that a family who had long been residents of Marshall was claimed by a Southern slaveholder. During the alarm this family concealed themselves by favor of the neighbors. Some of them lay for a long time in the barn of Edward McMahon, then a merchant of the place, and were fed by his sister, who carried food to them in a hog pail, to avoid suspicion. The first alarm passed away, the owners being unable to find their property; but in February 1848 another attempt was made. The neighbors were alarmed by shrieks before day-break one morning, and proceeding in the direction, found a wagon standing by the roadside before the house of Adam Crosswhite, a colored man living in the suburbs, northeast part of the village. Troutman, an attorney for a southern slaveholder, accompanied by three stout, rough looking men, had already bound one of the family, and they were proceeding to force the others, to enter when the crowd arrived to the rescue. The explanation given was that the Crosswhites were runaway slaves from Kentucky, whom Troutman identified and claimed as his client's property. The younger children born in Marshall, being helpless and valueless, he seemed willing to leave; but the original stock he claimed and was preparing to take them with him by force. The excitement the crowd manifested intimidated the kidnappers; more than a hundred resolute men insisting on the "rights of men" were too powerful. They retired; and that night the family were conveyed in a wagon to Jackson; then they took the train to Detroit and passed over to Canada. The slaveholder sued for "rights" in the district court at Detroit in 1849, on which occasion the fugitives returned under safe conduct, obtained by Canadian authorities from the United States, to give evidence, Judge Wilson having guaranteed that they should not be molested. Troutman received judgement for the value of the slaves who were rescued from him, to the value of \$1,000. After the trial the former slaves remained in Michigan as free men.

The case is chiefly remarkable, in a historical point of view, as having been the occasion or perhaps the pretext made, for asking for a more stringent law for the capture of runaway slaves, such as was introduced by Mr. Henry Clay into the senate soon after this affair. The action of the citizens of Marshall in assisting the slaves to escape Troutman, gave rise to large public meetings in Kentucky, and to violent and even tumultuous expressions of public opinion among the slaveholders. The fugitive slave law of 1850 was the immediate result.

The people of Marshall were very much interested in the slavery question from that time on. At the breaking out of the civil war a company of the First Michigan Volunteers, numbering 110 men and officers, went for the defense of the nation. This regiment participated in the first battle of Bull Run. Many from the Marshall company were killed or wounded. At the expiration of the 90 days, for which time they had enlisted, the company returned home, many of them enlisting again later on. An independent company of mechanics and engineers, but under national command, went out in '63 and did service for their country in various instances. A portion of the 24th Michigan was also organized in Marshall.

As Marshall grew older she soon began to assume urban airs, becoming a city in 1859. Improvements were gradual and in keeping with the times. The city was lighted with gas for the first time in 1872, this company being known as the Marshall Gas Co., owned by Woodson & Updyke, of St. Louis, Mo. Oil gas was first manufactured, but was changed to the coal gas method in 1878. In 1886 the United Gas Improvement Co., of Philadelphia, purchased the

plant and converted it into the system of water gas manufacturing. This company owns the plant at the present time, A. G. Fox being superintendent.

An electric lighting plant was first agitated for the city by individuals as far back as 1890. Nothing was accomplished however. Finally, the city was stirred up to action on the question; the water power belonging to the Perrin estate on south Marshall Ave. was purchased for \$17,000, and was to be used not only as motive power for electric lighting but for manufacturing plants that might be induced to come here, as well. A commission consisting of three members, G. H. Southworth, W. H. Elston and R. B. Fletcher was appointed by the Mayor, to purchase and erect the plant and put all in operation. The present board is W. H. Elston, Chairman, Amos Wilson and J. L. Dobbins. The lighting plant, whose power house is located on South Marshall Ave. consists of two 65 arc light dynamos, one alternating incandescent dynamo with a capacity of 600 lights; of the arc lights, there are three circuits; one lighting the stores and two for street service, 130 arc lamps in all.

The Brush Company, of Cleveland, put in the plant at the expense of \$14,000. The lines of the system have been constantly increasing until now the capacity of the machinery is fully tested and steps soon will need be taken to enlarge in order to accomodate demanding customers.

The press of the city has been confined mostly to two publications, the present ones. A slight change has been made in cognomens but otherwise all is as of years gone. The Democratic Expounder first saw the light of day in 1837, and was founded by H. G. Bunce, who ran it for some time. It afterwards passed into the hands of Mann & Noyes, Lucius G. Noyes being editor. In 1858 Frances W. Sherman assumed editorial chair and remained there until his death, Chastain Mann succeeded Mann and Noyes and upon the death of Mr. Mann in 1872, Samuel S. Lacey became editor and publisher. The present publisher bought the paper in 1888.

The Chronicle, a daily sheet was started under the management of Boughton and Denison in 1879. The Chronicle and Expounder were consolidated in 1885 and have been under the same management since. Both are owned and published by J. M. Moses, who has had control since 1888.

The Western Statesman, now known as simply The Marshall Statesman, was first issued Sept. 12, 1839, it being the organ of the Whig party until its expiration, after which it adopted Republican principles and is such at the present. It was founded by Seth Lewis and was in the hands of the Lewis estate several years. The present management since July, 1892 has been T. G. Stevenson, publisher and Will H. Arthur, manager.

The members of the bar who have practiced in Marshall, forms a list which for as large a number of notable men, the city has no equal in any town of its size in the world. The first two men to practice here were Prentis S. Hewitt and Stephen Preston. Others who followed were, J. Wright Gordon, Ex Gov. of Michigan; Edward Bradley, Congressman; Judge Albert Pratt, circuit and supreme judge and minister to Honduras under Buchanan; Judge Robt. Cross; John Van Arman, the great criminal lawyer of Chicago; Parson Willard, Ex Gov. of Indiana; E. M. W. Wilkerson, U. S. senator from S. Dakota; Geo. C. Gibbs, first reporter of supreme court; Gen. Isaac E. Crary, congressman; Chauncey Schaffer, Henry W. Taylor, N. S. Balch, Harry K. Clark, Jas. A. Way, W. W. Cook and L. T. N. Wilson. Those who practiced here and went to Grand Rapids are: Mr. Roods, Thos. C. Church, E. S. Eggleston, Francis A. Stone, Lyman C. Morris, D. Darwin Hughes, John C. Fitzgerald, Thos. J. O'Brien, Frank G. Holmes. Then came Sidney Thomas, now in California; Walter I. Hayes, congressman from Iowa; Wm. P. Greenough, now professor in Harvard college and of the firm of Allen & Greenough, author of latin text books; H. A. & L. G. Noyes, Wells Wilder, Thos. G. Pray, Geo. H. Penneman, N. S. Harwood, of Lincoln, Neb.; James P. Lodge, of St. Louis, Mo.; Wm. D. Adams, Will S. Geer, Judge Shubel F. White, Jas. A. Miner, M. Cunningham, Wm. W. Wyckoff. Wm. H. Brown is the only living attorney in practice here to-day, who was here contemporaneously with all these men. For a list of the present practioners consult the classified list of business and professional men.

The water works plant was erected and put in operation here in 1888. The reservoir system is used: a stand pipe 100 feet high and 20 feet in diameter is kept filled with water pumped

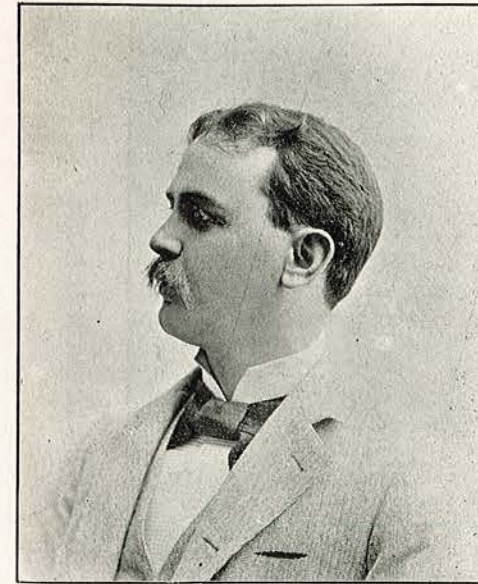
from a cistern 35 feet in diameter and 14 feet deep. Two independent, duplex acting Worthington pumps do this work. The company consisted of outside capital; the plant is estimated to have cost \$50,000, and was bonded for \$110,000. This was in 1888. In August 1894 the plant was placed in the hands of a receiver and is still in this condition. The city and the insolvent company are at war with each other. One wants to buy at a certain price and the other is desirous of selling at a certain price. Both imagine that they have each other "on the hip" and there the matter will stand until settled by the foreclosure of mortgages on the plant. It is impossible to get any information from the receiver for any purpose whatever, which accounts for the brief notice of the water works plant.

Marshall of today, is a city of 4,585 souls according to the census of 1894, and by the same authority the third municipality in size in Calhoun county. Within the past four years it has increased 618; at the present rate of increase it will have a population of 5,300 persons in 1900.

The outlook is promising for such an increase, conservatively estimated and to be a trifle radical it may reach the 6,000 limit. A hustling class of business men have recently located here and have infused an activity into the business of the place that is astonishing, when compared with that of ten years or less ago. To get an idea of the live business people in the place, the reader should consult the business cards appearing in the general list and also in the list of additions and corrections. Persons who pose as business men in a place of this size and who refuse to patronize its city directory, make evident the fact that their ideas of assisting in making a good reputation for the town are if anything negative in character and somewhat a trifle rural. To the stranger in the city, the publisher of this volume desires to state that this book, whatever be its intrinsic or other value, is due almost directly to the patronage of about one half of the business and professional men. The other half couldn't see the advantages of such a work as this or, if they could, they refused absolutely to take any stock in it, peculiarly speaking. And by the way, it might be remarked that to remove from this city, nine out of ten of those who left the city directory out of their consideration, they hardly would be missed.

The numbering system used in designating houses in the city is, by itself, a good one yet is hindered severely by two other systems that had been introduced, previously; when these old numbers are removed all hinderance will be eliminated. The system followed out in this directory is that which the post office authorities arranged at the time an attempt was made to have free delivery of mails. This system is as follows: All north and south streets are numbered, commencing at the north end of each street and continuing to the south limit of the street. All even numbers are on one side of the thoroughfare and the odd on the opposite. All east and west streets are numbered commencing at the eastern limit of the street and continuing to the west, until the street ends or the city limit is reached. Thus the advantage arises that there are no east and west or north and south streets and no confusing duplicate numbers as is often the case when there are east and west and north and south streets. And too, the subscriber can tell on what portion of the street the desired individuals lives, for if the number be large the residence is on the south or west side part of the street, according as the street runs north and south or east and west; and as well, if the number be small the residence is located on the northern or eastern portion of the street. In the business portion, every ground floor door has a number; in the resident portion every 66 feet requires a number.

THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS



F. MARTIN TOWNSEND.

THE Marshall Public Schools form a completely graded system extending from the Kindergarten to the door of the University. There are five buildings, that including the high school being a massive and expensive structure pictured elsewhere in this volume. The total enrollment of pupils for the current year (1894-5) is 783, of whom 122 are in the high school. This is the largest number ever in attendance at the latter department.

The superintendent is F. Martin Townsend, A. M., a graduate of the University of Michigan and of the college of St. Francis Xavier, New York city. Mr. Townsend is favorably known as a conductor of private parties visiting Europe in summers, and as the author of text books on Latin elements and conversation and on English grammar. He has had thirteen years experience as a teacher, gained in New York, New Orleans and Philadelphia.

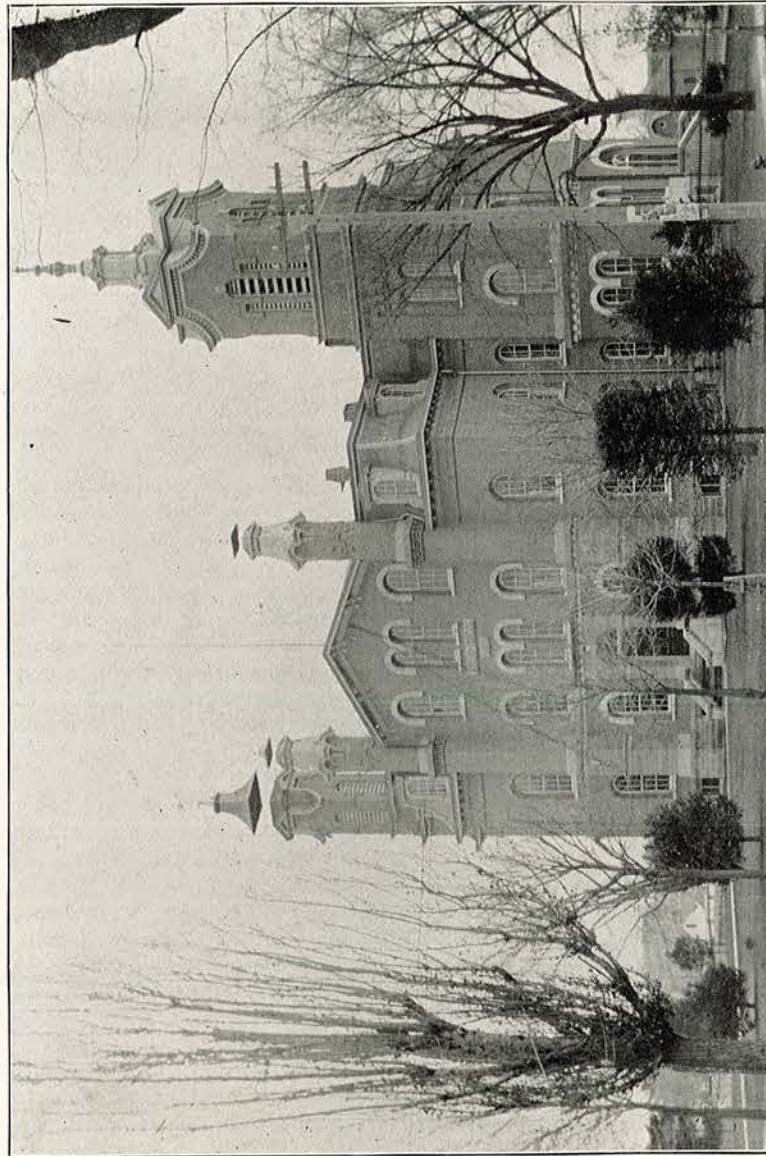
Ralph S. Garwood, A. B., is principal of the high school, to whom much of its efficiency is due. He is assisted by Miss Gertrude B. Smith in mathematics, Miss M. Louise Obenauer, A. B., in latin and english, and Mr. George Miller, B. S., in sciences, Mr. Garwood and the two last are Ann Arbor graduates.

In the grammar department the teachers are Maria L. Root, Mary F. Blakeslee, Fannie Geer, Jennie B. Rue, Belle C. Watson, Harriet Fletcher. In the primary department Mabel B. Sterling, Minnie Maser, Carrie B. Halsey, Nettie E. Brooks, Florence Harper, Winnie B. Miller, Annie L. Denison, Louise Vernor, Carrie A. Bennett, Grace Burgdorf. Miss Olive Bennett is special teacher of music.

Non-resident pupils this year are 32 in number.

The high school offers academic courses (classical, latin, scientific) of four years each, that admit to the university on diploma, and a finishing course of three years.

The board of education comprises Wm. H. Porter, moderator; John E. Foley, director; F. W. Dickey, S. H. Gorham, E. G. Brewer.

CHURCHES.

PRESBYTERIAN.

The Presbyterian church, of Marshall, was organized in the Marshall Academy (now the residence of Mrs. L. A. B. Hall) on High street, June 26, 1841, Rev. Elias Childs, presiding. The membership then numbered 38. The first regular minister was Rev. J. R. Cleveland, who supplied the pulpit until the fall of 1843. During that time the Church held services in the court house, then standing in the center of the city park. In 1842 Jabez S. Fitch commenced the erection of the brick church on Main street, about 25 feet west of the present Post Office, to be occupied by said Church with the intention of ultimately selling it to them. The death of Mr. Fitch delayed the completion of the church until after the Church and Society purchased it in 1844. They occupied it until 1873. In the spring of 1872, the present spacious and imposing church edifice on the corner of Mansion and Eagle streets, was commenced to be erected, and completed in the fall of 1873. In the meantime the old church on Main street had been sold and torn down. The present church edifice was built at the cost of \$50,000 and has a seating capacity for 750.

Rev. Samuel H. Hall, the first installed pastor of the church, served the church in that capacity from 1844 to 1853. Since that time the pastors and stated supplies have been Rev'ds James H. Trowbridge, James Vincent, Wm. A. McCarkle, Livingston Willard, F. F. Ford, Francis M. Wood, Wm. A. Rice, E. P. Johnson, Henry M. Morey, Wm. W. Curry and Emmett W. Rankin. Notwithstanding the sad inroads of death and dismissals the church has been fairly prosperous, so that the membership at this date, Dec. '94, is 350.

CHRISTIAN.

The first Christian church of Marshall was organized on the second day of March, 1850, with nine members. The first trustees were Z. M. Lester, Azor Rowley and Peabody Ingalls. The first pastors were Rev. J. S. White and Rev. D. E. Millard. The first organization was affected in the old depot building, which was then in charge of Z. M. Lester. The place of meeting was soon removed to the third story of the brick building on the corner of Grand and State street, known as Missionary Hall. The present church building was erected in 1851 or 1852, which stands on the corner of Hanover street and Marshall avenue. It has been a home church to all who would attend, formed on the principles of union of all christians. The Church building has been thoroughly improved and repaired under the leadership of the present pastor, Rev. P. W. McReynolds, who is a young man of fine ability, energy and push, and has brought the church from a very low state, to its present prosperous condition.

ST. MARY'S.

The first record of Catholicity in Marshall dates back to Oct. 28, 1837. The date of the organization of the place as a village, when Rev. Father Morrissey took charge of the funeral service of a member of this denomination. Father Morrissey's home was at Northfield, Mich. He came to Marshall on horseback or by stage coach, six or eight times a year. Father Morrissey was succeeded in Northfield by Rev. Thomas Cullen, who organized stations for which churches were afterwards built and Priests assigned in latter years. Among these missions organized, was Marshall. Mass was said in one house and then in another. The court house was used for the purpose once or twice; so also was a small brick school house, located on east Green street. Meetings were held also in an old Congregational church, situated just west

of the Beach residence on Green street. In 1842 on account of the increased number of Catholics, mass was regularly said in the old oil mill located on Marshall avenue. Owing to the rapid growth of Marshall in those days and consequently an increase of Catholics, the necessity of building of a house of worship became evident. Accordingly Father Cullen selected the present site, corner of Eagle and Green streets. The lot was purchased for \$200 and a cheap edifice erected costing \$1,800. This building now stands on Hanover street. The first altar was one obtained from St. Ann's church of Detroit, which was then the cathedral of the diocese. It is a valuable relic and is now preserved in the chapel at St. Mary's cemetery. In the meantime Marshall became a parish, the second one along the line of the Michigan Central, Ann Arbor and Northfield being the first. Father Hennessy was the first resident pastor; he assumed charge Oct. 1852. He had charge of missions in Albion, Jackson, Battle Creek, Kalamazoo and Charlotte. The first parish pew rental occurred Dec. 1, 1852. Fifty one were rented, the highest for \$12, the lowest \$4 a year. The parochial residence was built in 1852, at the cost of \$800. The church was dedicated in 1853 and solemnly blessed by Rt. Rev. Peter Paul LeFevre and dedicated to God and under the title of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Rev. P. C. Koopman succeeded Father Hennessy in May 1855. Rev. C. M. Frain was assigned successor to Father Koopman in 1857. Father Callaert came next in 1868; Rev. Wm. J. Fierle temporarily succeeded Father Callaert; Rev. M. P. Willigan was appointed here in Sept. 1881, remaining until April 1882. He was succeeded by the present rector, Father Baart.

The present beautiful church edifice was erected and dedicated Oct. 21, 1888. The church is in a flourishing condition, having a membership of 1000. Since 1857 a parish school has been connected with St. Mary's church. In 1882 a new building was erected containing all modern improvements and the scope of the school enlarged so that its course now consists of the regular academic studies and both vocal and instrumental music. The teachers are the Sisters of the Immaculate Heart of Mary. The average number of pupils is 125. In 1885 a new rectory was built to replace the old one of 1852. St. Mary's congregation thus having all the requirements, was made an irremovable rectorship in the diocesan synod of 1890.

BAPTIST.

The Baptist church of Marshall had its origin amidst very humble and unpretentious surroundings. In the year 1840 a few Baptists had become residents of the village of Marshall and the adjacent country including the village of Marengo. These few held a meeting in January 1840, at the home of John Winters in Marengo township, to consider the practicability of founding a church. A month later a second meeting was held at the home of Calvin Ludden in this city, the same persons, (six in all) being present at the first meeting. Subsequent meetings were held February 15 and 29; at a fifth meeting held March 7 in the old school house on Mansion street, at which meeting they were 22 in attendance, conclusions to organize a church were reached. Articles of faith and a church covenant were adopted. Rev. T. Z. R. Jones was requested to become pastor and accepted the call. The church was organized as such April 8, 1840, Rev. Jones was pastor and David N. Salter and Edwin McWithy, deacons. The first and present church edifice was erected in 1850-51, at a cost of \$7,000, previous meetings having been held in school houses and private residences. On May 20, 1843, the church became known as the Baptist church, of Marshall. The pastors of the church have been; Rev. T. Z. R. Jones, 1840; W. A. Bronson, Dec. '40 to July '43; pastoral vacant until Jan. '50; H. L. Moore, '50 to '56; L. D. Palmer, March '56 to '62; E. Curtis (supply until Sept. '63; until '68 pastorate vacant; Rev. M. Burton, Jan. '65 to April '65; Rev. Mr. Post, 'Oct. '65 to Dec. '66; until June '69 pulpit filled by members of Kalamazoo college and others; S. R. Gilbert, Jan. '69 to June '70; Rev. J. M. Ferris, 3 years; J. Shashall, 7 years; W. J. Pattengill, 4 years; Rev. Dr. Dunn, 2 years; B. F. Tabor, 2 years; C. W. Brinstad commenced Aug. '92 and is now pastor of the church. The church now has a membership of 192, with a Sunday school containing 100 members.

METHODIST EPISCOPAL.

The history of the Methodist Episcopal church, of Marshall, begins with that of the first settler and founder of the city, Sidney Ketchum, who, having selected a location here, in Aug. 1830, brought his family the following summer, others coming with him, and during the fall he built the first house, a log cabin, on the ground now the beautiful lawn in front of the residence of W. J. Dibble, in the rude, unfinished house, without doors or windows and but part of a floor of split plank; here were conducted the first religious services by Randall Herbert, a local preacher, Aug. 14, 1831. About the first of October, Rev E. H. Pilcher came to Marshall as the preacher in charge of Tecumseh circuit, which embraced Jackson, Calhoun, Hillsdale, Branch and part of Washtenaw and Lenawee counties, preaching in Mr. Ketchum's house, on the 6th of November; on his second visit to Marshall, he organized a Methodist class, the first church organization in the county, with Randall Hobart leader, Ruth, his wife, Sidney and Catherine Ketchum, Seth and Eliza Ketchum as members. The first communion or sacrament of the Lord's supper celebrated in Calhoun county, was an occasion of a two day's meeting held June 6 and 7, 1832, in the old school house, which stood just in front of its present site, it now serving as a barn on the lot just east of the residence of E. G. Brewer. Rev. Mr. Pilcher was assisted by the Rev. Mr. Fowler, from the state of New York. Although there were only 7 or 8 to commence, the record says it was a season of refreshing. The membership increased to 15 during the year, and continued to worship in the school house until Dec. 1838, when they removed to the basement of the new church. In Nov. 1835 a meeting was called to consider the propriety of building a church. It was resolved to raise \$3,000 with which to build a brick church. Sidney Ketchum subscribing \$1,000 and giving the lots on which to build. Subsequently it was resolved to increase the subscription to \$5,000; Mr Ketchum pledging \$2,000 and in the summer of 1836, nothing having been done toward erecting the church, further than obtaining a subscription for a part of the amount proposed, Mr. Ketchum commenced the building and inclosed the same in 1838 at an expense of \$9,000, which he deeded with the two lots on which it was built to the church. This building was of stone 45x65 feet, built in gothic style with a tower and a bell. At a meeting of the board of trustees, July 12, 1839, it was resolved to circulate a subscription paper to raise funds with which to finish the church, and O. C. Comstock, A. B. Cook and W. H. Walker were appointed a building committee. The membership of the church had increased to 100. At the annual conference of this year Marshall was constituted a station and in Aug. 1840 the conference convened in the new church. Rough boards were laid down for a floor and arranged for seats in the auditorium when the session was held. Subsequently the church was completed with stylish pews with the unnecessary appendage of a door to clatter at the entrance of each occupant; the most desirable of these being the square box pews, in either of the amen corners. The pews were upholstered by the occupants in various styles to suit their taste and financial ability. A gallery across the rear supported by two pillars in the center, surmounted by two more, which based the roof, upon which the tower rested so heavily, as to cause fear to many worshipers when the wind blew strong, and of anxiety to the official board. Finally the 28th of May 1854 it was resolved to take the tower down and enclose a suitable belfry. A. C. Robinson, Wm. Paxton and J. V. Vernor were the committee appointed to raise funds for the expense but it was nearly ten years before the tower was removed. In Aug. 1854, it was decided to build a parsonage and \$854 subscribed. The contract was let to Wm. Paxton for \$850; the building committee were A. C. Robinson, J. H. Wells and B. Drake. In 1858 the furnaces were put in and the chimneys rebuilt in Dec. the same year. The lots were bought and the sheds and barn were built. A debt commencing with the completion of the parsonage reached \$725 in 1861. In 1870 the church was rebuilt and dedicated on Oct. 16, it burned the following February and was rebuilt in '71, completed in '73, and dedicated July 13; Dr. Fowler preaching on this occasion. A debt of \$4,000 was here incurred; which, secured by a mortgage, finally closed the church in July of '79. In March 1880 it was reopened and the debt canceled July 4, and has remained free from debt to the present time. The membership at this date is 220. W. W. Devine is the present pastor.

TRINITY EPISCOPAL.

The first service of the Episcopal church was held in a school house on the lot now occupied by the residence of E. G. Brewer, on Mansion street, in the summer of 1836, at which time the population of the village was about 300. In the spring of 1837 the parish was organized and S. W. Gordon and Montgomery Schuyler were chosen wardens, and J. H. Montgomery C. T. Gorham and Andrew Mann elected vestrymen. The first church was built in 1837; this church was sold April 3, 1858 to the Lutheran congregation and the present stone church, corner of Mansion and Division streets, was built in the summer of '61, by M. Benedict, builder. This church has had a substantial growth. The pastors of the church have been as follows: Rev. Samuel Buel, Montgomery Schuyler, E. A. Greenleaf, J. S. Sarge, Hiram Adams, Alva Guion, H. N. Strong, Charles Jones, S. S. Chapin, John Dunn, W. H. Moffett, G. P. Schetky, H. B. Whittmore, J. E. Walton, Wm. Morrall, Wm. H. VanAntwerp, The present rector, 1894, is Beckwith.

EVANGELIST LUTHERAN CHURCH.

The first services of this church were held November, 1855 in the old court house then located in the present public square, Kalamazoo Ave. In 1860 the Church purchased the building belonging to the Episcopal Church and is the present house of worship for the Lutherans. The first pastor of the Church was Rev. Fred. Schmidt, of Ann Arbor, who preached to the congregation monthly sermons.

The first resident pastor was Rev. Mr. Spring. The original membership was 26. At present the congregation numbers about 100. A Sunday School was organized with the church in '55 and has been successfully continued since containing now 80 members.

The pastors since are Revs. Hennike, Schlinker, Brecht, Stamm, Fritz. The present pastor is Rev. Boehner, who has presided over the denomination since 1888.

The first officers of the church were: Vorstehers, Phillip Keuchle, John Kappis; Trustees, Peter Katz, Lorenz Walz and Matthew Strobel.

The present officers are: Vorstehers, Joseph Heiser, Geo. Graff, G. F. Kast; Treasurer Phillip Lutz, Secy., Henry Bauer; Collector, Carl Waidelich; Carl Noneman, Scriber.



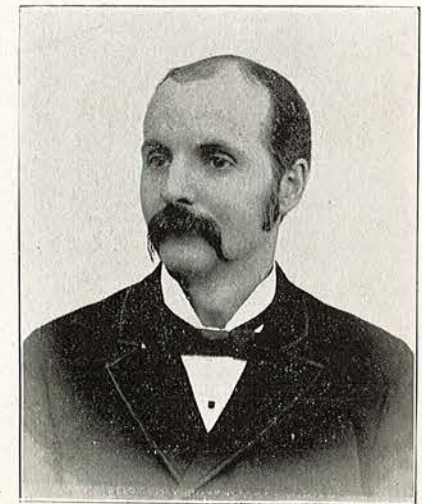
